# Thursday, January 22, 1970

THREE O'CLOCK P.M.

This being the first day of the first meeting of the Twenty-ninth Parliament or Legislative Assembly of the Province of British Columbia for the dispatch of business, pursuant to a Proclamation of Colonel the Honourable John R. Nicholson, P.C., O.B.E., Q.C., LL.D., Lieutenant-Governor of the Province, dated the 17th day of October, 1969, the members took their seats, after having taken the prescribed oath and having signed the Parliamentary Roll.

Colonel the Honourable John R. Nicholson, P.C., O.B.E., Q.C., LL.D., Lieutenant-Governor of the Province, having entered the House, took his seat on the Throne.

The Hon. W. D. Black, Provincial Secretary, said:—

Members of the Legislative Assembly:

I am commanded by His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor to announce that he does not see fit to declare the cause of his summoning you at this time, and will not do so until you have chosen a Speaker to preside over your Honourable Body. His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor hopes to be enabled to declare, during the afternoon, his reasons for calling you together.

His Honour was then pleased to retire.

The Hon. W. A. C. Bennett, addressing himself to the Clerk, moved, seconded by the Hon. L. R. Peterson, that William Harvey Murray, Esquire, member for Prince Rupert Electoral District, do take the Speaker's chair and preside over the meetings of this Assembly.

A debate arose.

Mr. Macdonald, addressing himself to the Clerk, moved, seconded by Mr. Hall, that Garde Basil Gardom, Esquire, member for Vancouver-Point Grey Electoral District, do take the Speaker's chair and preside over the meetings of this Assembly.

The debate continued.

On the first motion being put, the House divided.

# "General Election, August 27, 1969

"SIR,—The Twenty-eighth Legislative Assembly of the Province of British Columbia was dissolved on July 21, 1969, and writs were issued on that date, calling for a general election. Writs were made returnable on September 27, 1969, but due to a judicial recount held in the Kootenay Electoral District, return day had to be altered to October 10, 1969.

"August 13, 1969, was designated as the day for the nomination of candidates, and polling-day was August 27, 1969.

On the motion of the Hon. W. D. Black, seconded by the Hon. F. X. Richter, it was Ordered,—

That the letter of the Deputy Provincial Secretary and the certificate of the Chief Electoral Officer of the results of the election of members be entered on the Journals of the House.

His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor again entered the House and took his seat on the Throne. The Speaker, standing on His Honour's right, then spoke to the following effect:—

# MAY IT PLEASE YOUR HONOUR:

The House of Assembly have elected me as their Speaker, though I am but little able to fulfil the important duties thus assigned to me.

If, in the performance of those duties, I should at any time fall into error, I pray that the fault be imputed to me, and not to the Assembly, whose servant I am, and who, through me, the better to enable them to discharge their duty to their Queen and country, humbly claim all their undoubted rights and privileges, especially that they may have the freedom of speech in their debates, access to Your Honour's person at all seasonable times, and that their proceedings may receive from Your Honour the most favourable interpretation.

The Hon. W. D. Black then said:—

# Mr. Speaker:

I am commanded by His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor to declare to you that he freely confides in the duty and attachment of the House of Assembly to Her Majesty's person and Government, and not doubting that their respective proceedings will be conducted with wisdom, temper, and prudence, he grants, and upon all occasions will recognize and allow, their constitutional privileges.

I am commanded also to assure you that the Assembly shall have ready access to His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor upon all seasonable occasions, and that their proceedings, as well as your words and actions, will constantly receive from him the most favourable construction.

His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor was then pleased to open the Session by the following gracious Speech:—

# Mr. Speaker and Members of the Legislative Assembly:

In opening the First Session of the Twenty-ninth Parliament of British Columbia, I welcome all Members and express my confidence that you will discharge your duties carefully and with wisdom for the lasting benefit of the people. Seated for the first time at this Session are nine new Members whose knowledge, I feel sure, will benefit the deliberations of this House.

May I recall to your memory that nearly one hundred years ago, in March, 1870, the Legislative Council of the Colony of British Columbia embarked on a lengthy debate on the question of union with Canada. This issue was one of great import, not only for the people living in British Columbia, but for the new nation that was beginning to take shape. Out of these deliberations there came a set of terms of union which, in June of that same year, were the subject of discussion with the Government of Canada. Our representatives in this negotiation, Members of the Legislative Council, have long been revered for their contribution to the evolution and development of our Province—Joseph W. Trutch, Dr. John S. Helmcken, and Dr. R. W. W. Carrall. Thus was the ground prepared for our transition from Colonial to Provincial status.

I am pleased to report to you that, pursuant to the provisions of the *British Columbia Centennial '71 Celebrations Act* passed at the last Session of this House, the British Columbia Centennial '71 Committee has been convened and already much progress has been made in the organization of the fitting commemoration of British Columbia becoming Canada's sixth Province, a most significant event in our history.

I note with sadness the death last month of Mrs. Nancy Hodges, the first woman Speaker of the British Columbia Legislature and first woman Speaker in the British Commonwealth. Her service to Canada was outstanding, first as a Member of the British Columbia Legislature and later as a Member of the Senate.

It is with regret I report the death last October of Alexander Small Matthew, a former Member of the Legislative Assembly for the Vancouver Centre Electoral District; a gentleman who served this Province and its people unselfishly and well.

During the past year the Province was host to many distinguished visitors, including His Royal Highness the Prince Philip, Duke of Edinburgh.

The twentieth conference of the Colombo Plan was held in Victoria during the month of October last. It is significant to note that this is the first time that meetings have taken place other than in the Capital of Canada. This conference has given us a deeper awareness and greater understanding of our neighbours in South and South-east Asia.

On October 27th last, the Honourable Philip Arthur Gaglardi assumed the portfolio of Minister of Social Welfare.

The Royal Commission appointed under the *Public Inquiries Act* to inquire into matters relating to the distribution, sale, and consumption of spirituous, vinous, and malt liquors within the Province, and the laws and regulations pertaining thereto, continues to carry out its function.

Last year, 26 members of the Bar of this Province were appointed Queen's Counsel. Included among these appointees was the first woman in British Columbia to be named a Queen's Counsel. To each of these I also extend my

congratulations.

Under the Centennial Cultural Fund Act of 1967, the Perpetual Cultural Fund was constituted and, under the Revenue Surplus Appropriation Act, 1969, the First Citizens' Fund, the Agricultural Aid to Developing Countries and World Disaster Areas Fund, and Physical Fitness and Amateur Sports Fund were established on a perpetual basis. Reports will be made to the Legislature concerning their respective programmes.

I am most pleased to note that the Annual British Columbia Festival of Sports, initiated by my Government, will be held in all parts of the Province from May 16th to June 1st.

Letters of Understanding have been completed between the Province and the adjoining States of Washington, Idaho, and Montana to provide for the use of Civil Defence equipment and manpower on a mutual basis in the event of a major disaster. Plans for the inclusion of Alaska are under negotiation. Civil Defence volunteers supplemented the efforts of the community of Trail in coping with the results of a major flash flood in April, 1969, thus bringing to the fore the value of our Provincial Civil Defence organization and the contribution by many departments of government within a co-ordinated programme.

In keeping with the progressive policy of my Government with respect to the restoration of historic sites within our Province, a cost-sharing agreement between the Government of Canada and the Government of British Columbia was completed on the 23rd day of April, 1969, respecting the acquisition of the historic buildings, lands, and other premises comprising the Hudson's Bay Trading Post at Fort St. James, and its restoration, maintenance, and establishment as a historic park.

Establishment of the new Field Consultant Service of the Library Development Commission is now a reality. First steps have also been taken toward the organization of library systems based on the regional district plan, and in this connection work is progressing in the Peace River, East Kootenay, and West Kootenay areas.

You will be asked to give consideration to the initiation, under the jurisdiction of the Honourable the Speaker, of a system of recordings on tape of proceedings in this House.

To extend the benefits of home ownership now provided by the Provincial annual home-owner grant and assistance to build new homes, you will be asked to consider legislation to provide further assistance to tenants by way of a grant or second-mortgage loan for the purchase of homes already in existence.

During the past year, over one thousand accommodations were authorized for the benefit of elderly citizens throughout the Province. Demands for this type of housing are continuous and my Government will provide further assistance under the *Elderly Citizens' Housing Aid Act* to meet this need.

A matter of prime concern in British Columbia today is the protection of our environment. There are many facets to the problem of environmental control. They range beyond those measures designed directly to minimize air, soil, and water pollution, to those so necessary in a programme of environmental health protection. My Government will continue to work toward the protection and preservation of our total environment, so that all our citizens may enjoy the beauties and wonders of our heritage as intended by nature. Reports will be made to the Legislature concerning the efforts and progress being made.

My Government is pleased to report that 10 new Provincial parks were estab-

lished in 1969, bringing the present total to 275.

The Capital Regional Park District, since its formation in 1966, has acquired or is in the process of acquiring seven parcels of choice recreational land. The Vancouver-Fraser Regional Park District, active since 1967, has already acquired extensive holdings in the Lower Fraser Valley.

To meet the growing pressure on our fresh-water sports fishery resource, reflected by the purchase of 187,000 angling licences by our residents, the stocking of lakes with hatchery-raised game-fish continues, together with our trout-spawning improvement projects. In addition, 135 lakes, mostly in the northern part of our Province, were surveyed for fisheries potential.

The travel industry continues to expand at the rate of approximately 10 per cent per year, and its economic impact is felt in every corner of our Province.

My Government is pleased to report that the mineral industry continued its steady growth. The concentrator at the Brenda open-pit mine, west of Peachland, will be in full operation early this year. Indications are that Island Copper Mines Ltd. mining property at Rupert Inlet will be brought into production in 1971 and the Lornex Mine in Highland Valley in 1972. Discovery and partial exploration of what appears to be a billion-ton orebody in Highland Valley is significant in that it is the first single orebody of sufficient size and grade of ore which may support a copper smelter in the Province. As a result, feasibility studies are being made with a view to the erection of copper smelting and, if feasible, refining facilities in British Columbia.

With completion of the Roberts Bank Superport bulk-loading facilities, coal from the Kootenay area will be exported to Japan to meet contracts which this year require delivery of 5,150,000 long tons.

Exploration activity in the oil and gas industry continued on a similar level to that in 1968. Drilling took place in the Bowser Basin north of Stewart, but the Peace River district remains the only area of production.

I am pleased to report that the Department of Public Works continues its programme of construction and maintenance in support of all my Government's activities throughout the Province.

Following very careful selection procedures, a design team of architects and engineers, composed largely of British Columbia talent, is making good progress with plans for a British Columbia Building in Vancouver.

My Government's extensive programme of highway improvement will continue in 1970. In almost all of the 38 highway districts, road reconstruction or paving and bridge replacement is in progress. Of special importance is the near completion of the Yellowhead Route 16 from Prince George to Tête Jaune Cache. Roads affected by the Columbia River hydro development have been relocated and much of the reconstruction is completed.

British Columbia Ferries report that the pattern of over-all growth in carriage of passengers and vehicles continued through the past year.

Various steps were taken to deal with this additional traffic offering. The most significant of these was the "stretching" of the *Queen of Esquimalt*, which, without loss of speed or handling ability, consistently carried well in excess of two hundred vehicles during peak loading periods. Consequently, the *Queen of Victoria* will be modified prior to this summer.

The upgrading of ferry passenger accommodation and service was completed elsewhere, particularly in the Sunshine Coast, Powell River, and Campbell River areas. In addition to new services between Quadra and Cortes Islands, the ferries owned by Coast Ferries Ltd. were purchased and as of June 15, 1969, incorporated

into the Ferry Service.

In 1969 the Pacific Great Eastern Railway completed the most successful year

of operations in its 57-year history. Carloadings climbed to record levels.

Two new railway extensions are under construction at the present time. A 73-mile leg of the Takla Lake extension, running from Fort St. James to Takla Lake in a north-westerly direction, is scheduled for completion at the end of 1970. A 250-mile link, extending in a northerly direction from Fort St. John to Fort Nelson, will be in operation by the end of 1971.

Initial surveys have been completed for a further extension of the Pacific Great Eastern Railway in a north-westerly direction from Takla Lake to Dease Lake, a distance of 300 miles. The extension to Dease Lake, by providing rail access to the resources of the area, will result in the development of the vast,

unsettled north-western quarter of the Province.

British Columbia maintained the expansion of its educational facilities in the public school sector in 1969. Although steps had to be taken late in the year to bring approvals for capital projects under careful review because of excessively high interest rates, my Government has authorized an all-time high expenditure of over \$60 million for construction of new schools this fiscal year.

The first phase of the Greater Victoria Vocational School was completed this month and is expected to commence operation in April, and construction was started last summer on a new regional vocational school at Kamloops, which is expected to

be ready for classes in the fall of 1971.

Considerable progress was achieved in the expansion of the network of regional colleges in 1969. Okanagan Regional College and Capilano Regional College completed their first full year of operation, and two more regional colleges came into existence last September, the College of New Caledonia at Prince George and Malaspina College at Nanaimo, bringing the total to six, including Vancouver City College and Selkirk College at Castlegar. At least two more colleges are expected to come into existence in the coming year, Douglas College in the Fraser Valley and Cariboo College at Kamloops.

Because of the success of this new form of post-secondary education, consideration is being given by my Government to permit the Greater Victoria School Board to proceed with a plebiscite for the establishment of a regional college serving

the southern end of Vancouver Island.

During last year, three presidents assumed office in the public universities of the Province: Dr. Walter Gage at the University of British Columbia, Dr. Bruce Partridge at the University of Victoria, and Dr. Kenneth Strand at Simon Fraser University. Construction programmes continue at all three institutions.

My Government has been pleased to learn that the Government of Canada has decided to reconsider its proposed legislation affecting educational television. By this action the door has been left open for the future educational use of cable facilities, and for a continuation of the harmonious co-operation that has existed in this Province with the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation.

The expansion of the industrial and commercial life of the Province continues to be reflected in an outstanding rate of growth in the labour force and improved working conditions. I am pleased to note that last year there were more persons employed in British Columbia than ever before. Further, the percentage rate of growth of the labour force in this Province was approximately three times that of the rest of the nation.

During 1969 the *Human Rights Act* was proclaimed and the Human Rights Commission and a Director were appointed. Administrative procedures have been established and every effort made to implement the provisions of the Act to the end that there shall be no discrimination in employment or accommodation.

You will be asked to consider amendments to the *Payment of Wages Act*, which will strengthen its provisions, thereby affording much greater protection to the working people of the Province in regard to unpaid wages.

As part of its service to both workmen and employers of the Province, it is the intention of the Workmen's Compensation Board to construct a Rehabilitation Centre in Richmond designed to accommodate injured workmen and to reduce the time and cost involved in returning injured British Columbia workmen to productive employment.

Indicative of my Government's concern in providing, under the Workmen's Compensation Board, increased benefits to widows, dependent children, and disability pensioners, in line with the increasing cost of living, pensions were increased on January 1, 1970.

The Workmen's Compensation Board awarded bravery medallions and cash awards totalling \$10,500, under the recently established Bravery Awards Plan.

The reorganization of the Courts continues, with the coming-into-force on August 1, 1969, of the *Provincial Court Act*.

The removal of most traffic offences from the Courts and the substitution of traffic-violation notices now operates by Proclamation in the whole Province, with the exception of the Counties of Vancouver and Westminster, where the effective date has been proclaimed as April 1st.

At the last sitting of the Legislature my Government, by means of amendments to the *Motor-vehicle Act* and the *Insurance Act*, made provision for a new and practical approach to the inseparable problem of highway safety and automobile-insurance coverage. On January 1st much of this legislation was proclaimed. A Committee of this Legislature will be asked to give further study to certain aspects of the new automobile insurance plan and to make recommendations for its improvement.

The Province's vital concern in protecting those who use our highways continues. A new motor-vehicle testing-station in Richmond was opened last month, and the contract has been awarded for a station in Burnaby.

Probation services have now implemented throughout the Province the policy enacted following your deliberations last year, under which criminal charges against juveniles do not proceed until the whole of the environmental situation is first examined to determine what is best for the juvenile and the community. Voluntary juvenile probation agreements without Court intervention are increasing. Under changes in the Criminal Code, adults may now be placed under a probation order, regardless of a previous conviction. It is a pleasure also to note that the population of our gaols has decreased, despite the increases in Provincial population.

You will be called upon to consider amendments in legislation to protect further the rights of individuals in relation to rental housing.

A new Motion Pictures Act will be submitted to you.

In keeping with developments in the Corrections Branch, you will have placed before you for consideration a new Corrections Act.

The Law Reform Commission provided for at your last Session commences its major work of overhauling the laws of the Province this month under the distin-

guished chairmanship of the Honourable E. Davie Fulton.

The Department of Agriculture remains aware of the need for continuing progress in the development of programmes and other measures that will perpetuate or improve the primary food-production resources of the Province, consistent with changing consumer demands and economic benefit to the producer. Continuous efforts are being made to encourage the application of the newer discoveries of agricultural science, coupled with the practices of modern business management.

At present the joint Federal-Provincial programme related to ARDA, which now runs to March 31st, is in process of negotiation for a further term. My Government is urging the Land Inventory programme be extended by the Federal

authorities to all areas of the Province not now included.

New regulations introduced in 1968 under the *Health Act* have resulted in improved sanitary standards which contribute to the protection of our environment. The Health Branch and the Pollution Control Board have co-operated in establishing water and air quality standards. Air quality standards will be incorporated in municipal and district air pollution control by-laws.

The passage of the *Treatment Resources Act* at the last Session of the Legislative Assembly has been of great assistance in the development of local community

resources.

Grants have been paid to eight non-profit societies which provide resources or facilities for the care of persons, particularly children, who are mentally disordered. Six new mental health centres were opened and the British Columbia Youth Development Centre, "The Maples," in Burnaby, is being phased into operation. The Eric Martin Institute of Psychiatry in Victoria was completed and a 50-bed pre-placement centre operated by The Woodlands School has been established in Maillardville. The main contract was let for the construction of the Glendale Hospital, a 300-bed extended-care unit for the mentally disordered. Tranquille School was established as a regional facility and the Riverview Hospital is now available to privately practising psychiatrists. The year 1969 was a decisive year in the development of regional and community based programmes, and these will be extended during this year.

The spiralling cost of hospital care was reflected in the increase of payments to our hospitals. In the present fiscal year over \$150 million will be paid by the British Columbia Hospital Insurance Service toward expenses incurred by residents.

Construction in the hospital field continues on a large scale.

A publication titled "Hospitals for Extended Care, A Programme and Design Guide," was completed in June of last year, the main objective of which was to expedite the design, production, and approval processes for extended-care hospital projects. In July of 1969 a Cost-Analysis Team was organized and assigned to the study of major hospital projects.

The Medical Services Plan of British Columbia established July 1, 1968, has fulfilled successfully my Government's expectations by extending to all residents of the Province comprehensive prepaid medical coverage at a reasonable cost. The Provincial Plan provides additional benefits and assured services beyond that required of participating Provinces under the Federal Medical Care Act.

The revisions to welfare legislation approved last year have resulted in improved services to children in conflict with the law and in the inspection and control of community-care facilities. Successful involvement in the self-help and local

participatory programmes of people needing help has produced noticeable benefits. Incentive programmes for employable persons receiving assistance and enlisting the aid of local businessmen through the British Columbia Alliance of Businessmen gives a new hope and sense of worth to many.

Last October, the Ministers of Welfare and their officials from Canada and the 10 Provinces met in Victoria for the first Federal-Provincial Conference on Welfare to be held outside Ottawa.

In order to facilitate the provision of better services to children, my Government will ask you to consider amendments to the *Protection of Children Act* and the *Adoption Act*. Further, to describe more accurately the changing role of the Department of Social Welfare, you will be asked to consider amending the *Department of Social Welfare Act* by renaming it the Department of Rehabilitation and Social Improvement.

Increased unemployment for marginal employees and the effect of rising prices, particularly in housing of unemployable persons, families on assistance, and the employed poor are serious problems. My Government will ask you to consider an increase in social allowance, boarding-home and nursing-home rates, and in the Provincial Government's Supplementary Social Allowance to pensioners, based on need.

The progressive forest policies of my Government are continuing to bring spectacular results in investment and production. The most recent developments reflect the impact of the newly required close utilization of the raw-material resource. The expanded development of specialty mills ensures a supply of residual chips for the record-breaking expansion in the installation of pulp and paper plants. This year, six of these will be under construction.

I am pleased to note that the water-pollution problems have been solved in all the new pulp installations and will soon be remedied in the older mills. Intensive research continues to resolve the problem of kraft-mill odour. Tax incentives offered by my Government covering the installation of all non-productive equipment installed only for pollution control has assisted with the tremendous improvement which has already been recorded.

The present fiscal year saw a number of significant developments in the expansion of lumber and pulp mills at Crestbrook, Bulkley Valley, Mackenzie, Kitimat, and Kamloops. Industry is also showing increased interest in wood resources of the Bella Coola and Peace River regions.

I am pleased to report that despite downward market trends, which started early in 1969, forest resource industries of British Columbia continue a general upward climb in the Provincial economy. While the United States remains our number one customer, it is likely that Japan, by the end of the fiscal year, will reach and even pass the United Kingdom to become our second-largest customer.

Our Forest Service and industry continue with the planting of seedlings and have sown at twice the volume of three years ago. They are meeting the planned production commitment of 75,000,000 seedlings by 1975.

I am pleased to inform you that my Government will introduce a new Land Act at this Session. I am certain the new Act will correct deficiences and improve procedures with respect to the disposition of Crown lands within the Province.

Evaluation of the Province's water resources and planning of its judicious use continues with assistance from our universities and outside scientists. Pollution control administrative facilities have been extended throughout the Province, with additional engineering advice and assistance being provided. The Federal Government continues its co-operation with respect to the Lower Fraser Flood Control improvements. A new agreement was entered into with the Federal Government,

making provision for a comprehensive study of Okanagan water problems. To foster consultation between the water-users in that region and my Government, arrangements have been completed for the establishment of the Okanagan Basin Board.

My Government suffered a grievous loss through the death of Mr. Newton P. Steacy, Commissioner for Trade and Tourism, British Columbia House, California. Provision has been made for continuity in our representation abroad by the appointment of a British Columbia Trade Commissioner to the staff of our Agent-General in London, and steps have already been taken to strengthen our representation in California.

The Province's economy has maintained its record growth-rate throughout 1969, with special significance in investment, employment, and housing. Trade through customs ports in British Columbia during 1969 set a new record, surpassing the previous record year of 1968.

The Bureau of Economics and Statistics has prepared numerous regional studies designed to encourage investment in and development of specific areas of the Province. This year, three separate regional economic surveys have been under-

taken as well as two new industry feasibility studies.

The Data Processing Centre, which provides service to all departments and agencies, continues to show increased use and has redesigned and reprogrammed many of its assignments.

My Government is pleased to report the completion of the British Columbia exhibition structure, of unique design, for Expo '70 at Osaka, Japan. Competent staff have been appointed and are fully prepared for the opening in mid-March.

The Department of Industrial Development, Trade, and Commerce, on behalf of my Government, will sponsor the 5th British Columbia International Trade Fair to be held at the Pacific National Exhibition grounds in Vancouver, from June 2 to June 12, 1971. This event will contribute much to our Centennial celebrations.

The Energy Board is continuing to forecast the electrical load and to disseminate its findings on the statistical survey of consumption of electric energy.

British Columbia Hydro and Power Authority experienced a productive year during 1969, meeting the requirements of a rapidly growing population and a steadily expanding economy. Important new power-generating and transmission facilities were brought into service and work was begun or continued on others.

Hydro's total electric generating capacity has increased by 146 per cent since 1960. The outlook is for continued high level of activity.

Dr. H. L. Keenleyside retired as Co-chairman of British Columbia Hydro during 1969, after a decade of dedicated service with the Authority and its predecessor, British Columbia Power Commission. During 1969, Duncan Dam and Hugh Keenleyside Dam came into operation in accordance with the provisions of the Columbia Treaty; it was the first full year of operation of the Arrow reservoir. Work advanced on schedule during 1969 on Mica Dam, the third and largest of the Columbia Treaty dams being built in this Province.

New transmission and distribution facilities brought increased power and improved service to industries and communities in the Peace River, Central and Southern Interior, and East Kootenay regions, as well as in the Greater Vancouver area. Similar benefits will result from work scheduled for completion this year on northern Vancouver Island and near Powell River.

The advantages of electric service were extended during 1969 to many remote communities to which service was not previously economically feasible. The expanded programme was made possible by an increased Provincial Government

contribution to British Columbia Hydro's Rural Electrification Assistance Fund, combined with a revised Hydro policy which reduced the contribution required from customers.

A liquefied natural-gas storage plant now under construction in Delta Municipality is scheduled to go into operation this September. The additional storage capacity will enable Hydro to meet peak demands during very cold periods at minimum cost.

British Columbia Hydro continues to have marked success in attracting new industries to industrial sites adjacent to its railway lines in Greater Vancouver and the Fraser Valley. Rail access and electric service were extended to the Roberts Bank Superport.

Though the Hydro Authority's revenues have been increasing, the cost of providing its various services has grown even faster, mainly as a result of spiralling interest rates and labour costs. Since British Columbia Hydro was formed in 1962, residential electric rates have been reduced four times and increased once. Similarly, the cost of gas to residential consumers was reduced twice during the same period.

Last month my Government gave special recognition to its long-time employees; 85 of whom received certificates of merit for 25 years of completed service and 54 employees with 40 years of service received gold watches. My Government appreciates the dedication of so many long-time employees. Their work, undoubtedly, has contributed much toward increased services to the public and enhanced the fine reputation of one of the best Civil Services in Canada.

The Public Accounts will be presented and estimates for the ensuing year will be submitted. Reports of the various departments of Government will be laid before you.

Mr. Speaker and Honourable Members, I leave you now. I pray that the blessing of Divine Providence will rest upon your labours.

His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor was then pleased to retire.

University of British Columbia, generally none, excepting in the following faculties, where total enrolment is restricted: Law, 240 eligible applicants were rejected, many of these were not residents of British Columbia; Medicine, 72 eligible British Columbia applicants were rejected; Dentistry, two eligible applicants were rejected; Social Work, 60 eligible applicants were rejected, many of these were not British Columbia residents.

"In both Simon Fraser and the University of British Columbia, students rejected in the special programmes listed might have elected an alternative programme."

Students are, therefore, continuously applying for admission, either directly at the schools or through the Federal Department of Manpower and Immigration which purchases a percentage of the available training spaces from the Province and makes its own selection according to the criteria established in the Federal Training Act for adults.
- "2. During the six months, July 1 to December 31, 1969, there were 11,484 students enrolled at various times. As of September 30, 1969, there were 4,893 adult students in training in the regional vocational schools, of this number 2,464, or 50 per cent, were sponsored by Canada Manpower.
- "3. During the six months, July 1 to December 31, 1969, there were 2,370 applicants for whom no immediate training spaces were available. During the month of January, 1970, 1,197 new students were enrolled. The remaining 1,193 applicants will be scheduled into future classes or counselled to apply for another type of programme."

"Road checks provide biological data used in determining population trends, structure, such as age classes of the kill and other specific information. Daily hunter success is obtained on road checks, but this information is highly subject to variation from weather conditions, time of season, etc. The hunter sample provides the only accurate measure of season success.

"The accompanying tables included with this reply summarize the answers to the questions that have been prepared.

"Hunter success trends are going down in the East Kootenay, and this does reflect declining populations of big-game animals in the region. The decline in big-game populations has not been caused by antlerless seasons. Populations appear to be adjusting to diminishing range-carrying capacity. The severe winter of 1968/69 also depressed game populations and 1969 hunting success in some measure beyond what would otherwise have been expected."

# **179** Mr. Hartley asked the Hon. the Minister of Recreation and Conservation the following question:—

With the rehabilitation of the One-mile Chain Lakes, in the Princeton area, a major camping problem is anticipated—all these lakes are adjacent to the highway.

Is the Minister considering developing adequate camping facilities on the following lakes: Round, Dry, McCaffery, Laird, Taylor, and Gladstone and, if so, when?

The Hon. W. K. Kiernan replied as follows:—

"No. While the Department maintains a Provincial park at Allison Lake and has been instrumental in the reservation of other areas on the lakes of this chain, early development of additional camp-sites there is not anticipated at this time."

By leave of the House, on the motion of the Hon. W. A. C. Bennett, the House reverted to "Presenting Reports by Standing and Special Committees."

Mr. Jefcoat presented the Report of the Select Standing Committee on Agriculture, as follows:—

## REPORT

LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE ROOM, March 24, 1970.

MR. SPEAKER:

Your Select Standing Committee on Agriculture begs leave to report as follows:—

Pursuant to motion of February 17, 1970, your Committee was ordered convened to study the following matter:—

That this House authorize the Select Standing Committee on Agriculture to study the following:—

- (1) The benefits or otherwise of separate classification of highly specialized commercial farms, marginal farms, hobby or retirement farms, and other such groupings when considering public programmes:
- (2) Efficiencies which might be accomplished in off-farm sector relating to the supply and marketing channels handling the food, the processing, the merchandising, and the financing.

The Committee to hear representations from the food and agricultural industry, organizations, and individuals, and report its findings to this House.

Ninety-one requests were mailed to food processors, wholesalers, and various food producer and agriculture organizations. A total of five briefs were presented to the Committee. These briefs were presented by the following:—

- (1) Federation of Agriculture:
- (2) British Columbia Turkey Breeders:
- (3) British Columbia Region of National Farmer's Union:
- (4) Western Food Processors:
- (5) British Columbia Egg Marketing Board.

Based upon the submissions to the Committee it would appear that the average income to the producer is too low, and that they do not receive an adequate share of the consumer price of products. It is for this reason that this Committee wanted to hear from processors, wholesalers, and retailers. Their submissions are essential if the Committee is to establish where the consumer dollar is applied.

The Committee is very disappointed with the lack of interest shown both last year and this year. It is essential that the Committee receive reports from the processors and marketing groups as well as producers. This lack of co-operation and information has prevented the Committee from completing a meaningful report. Therefore, the following recommendations are made:—

- (1) That the Minister review the terms of reference and recommend, at an early date, terms for next year, subject to the approval of the Legislature:
- (2) That these terms of reference be spelled out to all sectors of the industry throughout the year recommending that they be prepared to appear before the Select Standing Committee on Agriculture in 1971:
- (3) The Committee further recommends that food processing, marketing organizations, and producers, be notified by the Committee of the terms of reference and requested to appear early in the next Session.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

Mr. Capozzi presented the Report of the Special Committee on Automobile Insurance, as follows:—

## REPORT

LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE ROOM,

#### MR. SPEAKER:

Your Special Committee on Automobile Insurance begs leave to report as follows:—

The organizational meeting was held on Thursday, February 5, 1970. Mr. Capozzi was elected as Chairman and Mr. McDiarmid as Secretary.

The Committee received briefs and the following people appeared before the Committee:—

The Committee is grateful to Mr. Thomas Cantell, Superintendent of Insurance, who attended all meetings and provided a great deal of valuable information to the Committee.

(1) To consider whether section 14 of chapter 20 of the Statutes of British Columbia, 1969, which provides *inter alia* that no action shall be brought against any person for recovery of damages to property occasioned in an accident involving a motor-vehicle exceeding two hundred and fifty dollars and costs, should be proclaimed in force or amended and, if so, to what extent:

The no-fault coverage proposed under section 79 of Bill (No. 75) suggests that possible savings could be attained through the elimination of certain legal fees and adjustment costs. It further suggests that restricting the recovery of claims for damage to vehicles of less than \$250 to Small Debts Court would make people more responsible for their own accidents and repairs.

While in theory this has some justification, it became clear that the following could result:—

While the public might appreciate the reduction that could result in insurance costs, there would be considerable ill feeling when an accident occurred and the individual who was not at fault was obliged to go to Small Debts Court for the first \$250 damage. If uninsured the individual would have no recourse to recover any additional damage. This section if implemented could in effect require everyone to self insure for all damage over \$250.

In the case of property damage it would deprive a resident of all right to recover damages to property in excess of \$250 simply because he may have been involved in an accident involving a motor-vehicle. At the same time, the owner of the vehicle would have no responsibility for damage done by his motor-vehicle over \$250 even where he was at fault and no matter how irresponsible his actions might have been.

The possible result is that insurance premiums for property damage would be determined not by the driving standards of the individual who is insured but by the driving standards of the most irresponsible motorists.

It could also complicate the position of both residents and non-residents as to render it most difficult for them to clarify their rights while at the same time placing non-residents in a somewhat more favourable position than residents.

The brief submitted by the Victoria Insurance Agents' Association is very comprehensive and is attached for consideration. The essential theme in this presentation is contained in the following:—

"Legislation of this kind which largely removes the burden of paying for property damage caused through negligence from the guilty to the innocent is not likely to prove to be in the best interests of the public."

It is therefore the recommendation of the Committee that section 79 of Bill (No. 75) not be implemented at this time.

The Committee recommends that consideration and additional study be given to the following proposal of the insurance law subsection, British Columbia Branch, Canadian Bar Association, whereby the right of subrogation in respect to motor-vehicle damage would be withdrawn from insurers licensed to do business in the Province of British Columbia.

This envisages the retention of the individual's right to sue either for his deductible, or if he does not wish to carry collision coverage, then for the full amount of damage to his property. In other words, the law would be left as it is and all persons would have the right to sue or be sued in tort as heretofore, save and except that no insurer would have a subrogated right of action. This could result in a reduction in insurance premiums on the compulsory auto insurance coverage because (a) those carriers of the compulsory insurance would no longer be required to pay for property damage to other vehicles where such vehicles are insured and (b) investigation and adjustment expenses would be significantly reduced.

The Committee further recommends that the Automobile Board be asked to study a proposal whereby the cost of the compulsory package for third party liability would not be increased on a per accident basis, but a "deductible" amount would be inserted as a responsibility of the insured after each accident. Any unsettled claim would be paid from the Traffic Victims Indemnity Fund and the insured's driver's licence would be suspended until the Fund had been reimbursed.

In the event the Legislature decided to implement section 79 the Committee submits that the section should be amended as follows:—

- A. Property damage in section 79 (1) should be limited to motor-vehicles.
- B. That there should be no recovery in excess of \$150 (replacing the \$250 limit) for damage to a motor-vehicle, with a limit of \$300 for any one occurrence.
- C. The problems raised above created by section 79 (2) involving the rights of non-residents should be exhaustively studied and some solution found before the Proclamation.
  - (2) To consider whether the accident benefits described in the Second Schedule to the *Insurance Act* should apply to a motor carrier as defined in the *Motor Carrier Act*:

There is quite a basic difference between the position of the private automobile and the public transit operator.

The private owner generally decides who will ride with him and under circumstances which he either condones or agrees to.

The public transit operation is largely restricted to movements in high-density traffic and requires the carriage of a large number of passengers who are standing or moving about and board or disembark under varying conditions. Under the best of circumstances it would be difficult for the operator to determine the authenticity or the extent of any injuries which might occur.

In view of the circumstances and problems involved the Committee recommends that the Disability Income Schedule of the *Insurance Act* should not be made applicable to passengers travelling on, boarding, or alighting from public passenger vehicles. It is understood that this exemption does not apply to the death benefits nor in any way would exempt any other vehicles owned or operated by transit operators, nor interfere with normal tort liability.

(3) To consider whether automobile insurance premiums in British Columbia, including the premium charged for accident benefits, are commensurate with the risks assumed:

The services of a qualified actuary, Mr. Byron Straight, F.C.I.A., F.G.A.P., A.S.A., were retained by the Committee.

Mr. Straight was asked

(a) to do a general survey of premium rates:

- (b) to determine whether automobile insurance premiums could be reduced if the insurers allowed in advance for the investment income on unearned premiums and open claim liabilities:
- (c) to examine the premium increases (over 1969 rates) adopted by all the companies for the new death and disability income benefits.

The results of Mr. Straight's reports are attached.

In the opinion of the Committee based on the questioning of the individuals and groups appearing before the Committee and on the reports submitted by Mr. Straight the following conclusions can be drawn:—

- (1) While the rates in general show a certain conformity (this is to be expected since they are derived from the same actuarial base, the Green Book) there is a variance as a result of competition:
- (2) That the consideration of investment income in the calculation of insurance rates could lead to a reduction of 4 to 5 per cent:
- (3) By reducing the estimated length of disability the disability income portion of the costs in the new accident benefit rates could be reduced from 20 to 25 per cent resulting in a reduction in the estimated total costs of the new benefit claims by about 10 per cent:
- (4) By increasing the division of the premium dollar from 67 cents for "loss" and 33 cents for "expense" to 69 cents for "loss" and 31 cents for "expense" a further adjustment could be achieved. The Committee believes that in respect of the premium for the compulsory policy a more equitable division of the premium dollar should be 75 cents for "loss" and 25 cents for "expense":
- (5) Since the estimated number of automobiles that presently do not carry the compulsory package ranges between 5 to 10 per cent, and since the total cost of all claims, insured and uninsured, is therefore borne by the insured the cost of the compulsory package could be reduced by 5 to 10 per cent by requiring proof of coverage when licence plates are purchased:
- (6) While the problem of covering farm vehicles for limited highway use seems to have been solved by the special rates introduced by the company, a sample of these rates is attached, it is hoped the proposed Automobile Board would further clarify this position.

In view of the possible reductions suggested it is the recommendation of the Committee that section 250M of Bill (No. 74) be proclaimed, the Automobile Insurance Board be established, an actuary be employed, and the companies be asked to justify their rates for the present compulsory package and be required to obtain approval for future changes in these rates. This Board should be asked to study the cost and ramifications of various proposals whereby the compulsory package or portions of it could be operated by other than the industry.

It is further recommended that the Motor-vehicle Branch institute a procedure whereby proof of insurance, compulsory package only would be required, when licence plates are issued.

In the opinion of the Committee the Government has a definite responsibility to assure that the costs for the compulsory package are as low as possible since it should not legislate for excess profits, but it becomes more apparent that even though the major costs of automobile insurance are in the property damage and collision costs the majority of the driving public wants the right to decide what kind and how much collision coverage he places on his automobile.

There were many suggestions put forward as to how collision and property damage costs could possibly be reduced: (a) Reduction of agents' commission; (b) reduction of claims costs; (c) elimination of duplication of paper work; (d) standardization of forms and endorsements; and (e) reduction of adjustment expenses.

The Committee was dismayed to learn how little is being done by the insurance industry (a) to exert pressure on the auto industry to manufacture safer cars; (b) to encourage defensive driving courses and offer reduced premiums for graduates; and (c) to reduce claims costs, adjustment expenses, and excessive motor-vehicle damage claims.

The Committee felt that better control and policing is required by the companies to reduce costs of claims. Since the insurance companies base their rates on the Green Book, which in turn is based on the claims costs of the preceding year, there is no real pressure on the companies to reduce costs. There is, however, considerable evidence that the pressure of the auto-repair industry, the agent, and the automobile owner himself on the adjuster and the insurer is a definite factor in increasing costs. It is hoped that the industry would become its own watchdog and take steps to reduce claims costs, duplication, and commission expenses.

Fundamentally, however, the public must realize that the cost of automobile insurance merely reflects in dollars the real problem of human suffering, and accidents that careless and irresponsible drivers cause. There cannot be significant changes in rates until there are safer cars and safer drivers.

The Committee was extremely perturbed to note the almost 20 per cent increase in accidents in 1969.

The Committee believes that the Automobile Insurance Board should be given powers to investigate insurance costs and that the following programmes should be instituted:—

- (1) Driver training in all schools:
- (2) Defensive-driving courses become a requirement for all major violators of the point system:
- (3) Motor-vehicle testing be mandatory on a Province-wide basis:
- (4) Legislation be introduced requiring interim payments for property damage in clear liability cases:
- (5) Legislation be introduced requiring one month's notice to the claimant in order for insurance companies or their representatives to avail themselves of statutory limitations.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

Prayers by the Rev. W. F. Bahan.

Mr. McGeer rose to a question of privilege with respect to proceedings in the Select Standing Committee on Public Accounts and Printing, and moved,—

That the Select Standing Committee on Public Accounts and Printing, having been convened in camera without authority so to do being granted by the Committee, and before the statements of accounts of the Liquor Control Board had been discussed or other vouchers had been examined and the Chairman thereof having, contrary to the rules of the House, refused to convene a meeting open to the public, in compliance with parliamentary procedure, and thereby depriving members of their rights and privileges, this House hereby instructs the Chairman of the Committee to reconvene, in open meeting, to consider such vouchers and financial statements as remain to be disposed of before going into camera.

Mr. Speaker reserved his decision.

Mr. Nimsick asked leave to move adjournment of the House to discuss a definite matter of urgent public importance, namely, the application to the Canadian Transport Commission to connect the Kootenay and Elk Railway Company with the Great Northern Railway Company at the United States border.

Mr. Speaker reserved his decision.

Order for Committee of Supply called.

Pursuant to Order, the House again resolved itself into the Committee of Supply.

(In the Committee)

The Chairman reported progress. Report to be considered at the next sitting. Committee to sit again at the next sitting. Mr. Speaker delivered a reserved decision as follows:-

Honourable Members,—With the indulgence of the House I reserved my decision on a grievance raised as a matter of privilege by the honourable first member for Vancouver-Point Grey. The honourable member first referred to Standing Order 71 (1) which provides that the Standing Orders shall be observed in Select Standing Committees to the same extent as the same may be applicable to a Committee of the Whole House and then stated that a meeting of the Select Standing Committee on Public Accounts and Printing had been convened in a manner contrary to the rules of the House.

The essential question to be determined is whether the honourable member has a point of order or a point of privilege. In the Journals of the House, 1968, pages 134 and 135, I find that the Chair in similar circumstances considered what constituted matters of privilege. Reading in part from that ruling at page 135:—

"The 17th edition of May, at page 42, describes 'Parliamentary privilege' as 'the sum of the peculiar rights enjoyed by each House collectively as a constituent part of the high court of parliament and by the members of each House individually, without which they could not discharge their functions. . . . The privileges of parliaments are rights which are absolutely necessary for the due execution of its powers. They are enjoyed by individual members because the House cannot perform its functions without unimpeded use of the services of its members; and by each House for the protection of its members and the vindication of its own authority and dignity. When any of these immunities, both of the members individually and of the assembly in its collective capacity, which are known by the general name of 'privileges,' are disregarded or attacked by any individual or authority, the offence is called 'a breach of privilege' and is punishable under the law of parliament.

"In the same edition of May the privileges which attach to members of parliament individually are enumerated as follows: (1) Privilege of freedom of speech; (2) privilege of freedom from arrest or molestation; (3) privilege of access to the Crown.

"In Bourinot's 'Parliamentary Procedure,' 4th edition at page 303, 'questions of privilege' are described in general terms as referring to all matters affecting the rights and immunities of the House collectively, or to the position and conduct of members in their representative character.

"The power of this House to define those privileges is sanctioned by the Constitution Act, R.S.B.C. 1960, chapter 71, and such privileges have been largely codified in the Legislative Assembly Privileges Act, R.S.B.C. 1960, chapter 215.

"As explained by Dawson in the 2nd edition of 'Government of Canada' at page 399, the privileges of the individual member are primarily designed to enable the member to attend his parliamentary duties without interference and to encourage members to speak and act freely without fear of undesirable consequences."

As I have earlier indicated, the honourable member based his grievance on an alleged breach of Standing Order 71 (1) and the motion offered by him addresses itself to procedures "contrary to the rules of the House."

I must therefore conclude that the issue is clearly a point of order and not a point of privilege. Points of order must, of course, be resolved in the Committee and not in the House. Reference Journals, 1968, page 52.

Mr. Chabot presented the Report of the Select Standing Committee on Forestry and Fisheries, as follows:—

#### REPORT

LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE ROOM, March 25, 1970.

#### MR. SPEAKER:

Your Select Standing Committee on Forestry and Fisheries begs leave to report as follows:—

Pursuant to motion of February 24, 1970, your Committee was ordered convened to study the following matter:—

Resolved, That this House authorize the Select Standing Committee on Forestry and Fisheries to receive and study the following reports from the Forest Service:—

- (1) Slash-burning in the Interior:
- (2) Damage to forest values by mining development:
- (3) Application of the 30-50-per-cent contractor clauses in tree-farm licences.

Also to consider and report to the House on the total management responsibilities of the quota holders within any sustained-yield unit which is being cut to the maximum allowable harvest under close utilization standards.

Six meetings were held and representations were heard from the following: Forestry officials; Columbia Cellulose Company Limited; Rayonier Canada (B.C.) Limited; MacMillan Bloedel Limited; Weldwood of Canada Limited; Eurocan Pulp and Paper Company Limited; The Western Independent Log Haulers Association; Prince George and District Truck Loggers Association, Cariboo Lumber Manufacturers' Association; The Truck Loggers Association; and The Independent Squamish Logging Operators Limited.

The Forestry Committee appreciates the co-operation of the Forest Service

in collecting reports and submitting information on the various subjects.

Slash-burning in the Interior Under Section 116 of the Forest Act.—The Forest Service indicated to the Committee that in 1969 slash-burning was carried out in an orderly arrangement with industry and that escapes were negligible and the volume of timber destroyed was nil. Co-operation exists between industry and the Forest Service on slash-burning.

Your Committee recommends that the Forest Service continue to hold annual meetings with the Interior associations to assess the slash-burning guidelines on an annual basis.

Damage to Forest Values by Mining Development.—The Committee considered the report from the Forest Service on damage to forest values by mining development, no representations were received on the subject. The Forest Service indicated that after a further year's experience regarding submission of the notice of opening of a mine or quarry that there are now no undue delays in processing the notices through the offices of the District Inspector of Mines and the District Forester. There still appears to be a problem with timber being cleared without authority resulting from the mining companies failing to submit the "Notice of Opening of a Mine" or by failure to submit the notice in sufficient time prior to commencement of operations.

While the situation has improved, there is still a need for better co-operation. Your Committee recommends that the Forest Service in co-operation with the Department of Mines and Petroleum Resources, endeavour through meetings with the mining industry to reach a satisfactory solution to the problem of mineral exploration in forested areas.

Application of the 30-50-per-cent Contractor Clauses in Tree-farm Licences.—Your Committee appreciates the study undertaken by Mr. I. T. Cameron, Assistant Chief Forester, Operations, British Columbia Forest Service (Chairman); Mr. C. Joergensen, vice-president, Columbia Cellulose Company Limited, representing the licencees; and Mr. I. S. Mahood, owner director, Millstream Timber Limited, representing the contractors operating in tree-farm licences on the application of the 30–50-per-cent contractor clause in tree-farm licences. Your Committee heard several representations on this report from the licencees and the contractors.

The parties concerned expressed acceptance of the recommendations with the exception of Recommendation Nos. 5 and 8.

Your Committee was unanimous that the contractor clause should be based on volume rather than costs. After consideration it was agreed for the purpose of clarification that Recommendation No. 5 should read as follows:—

"In recommending acceptance of phase contracting, the Committee underlines that such contracting must relate directly to a particular share of the prescribed volume of annual allowable cut required to be offered. Within this context it is recognized that where 50 per cent of the harvest is to be offered for contract the licencee has the option of offering the volume in 'full contracts' or offering the same volume in 'phase contracts.' 'Phase contracts' should, whenever possible, offer a balanced share of the phases. The contribution of phase required to be contracted will ordinarily be measured by giving weight to the dollars expended thereon. In other words, if hauling is 10 per cent of the cost in a 'full contract,' then in determining the volume contributed by the hauling phase, the volume credited would be limited to 10 per cent of the volume required to be offered for contract. As a normal rule, where greater volume of contracting is done than required in a particular phase this excess would not be transferred to reduce the amount of contracting offered in another phase. In cases where this stipulation constitutes an impediment to effective planning of a contractor programme, for reasons of lack of suitable contractors, or unusual conditions prevailing within a particular tree-farm licence then the Minister may waive this stipulation after first hearing objections, if any, by contractors engaged within the particular tree farm."

After reviewing Recommendation No. 8 of the report your Committee recommends that all unsettled disputes arising between tree-farm licencees and contractors would be arbitrated within the provisions of the *Arbitration Act*.

Your Committee recommends the implementation of the report along with the amendment to Recommendation No. 5 as outlined.

Your Committee is of the opinion that the appendix to the report is not in accord with the intent of the contractor clause and recommends that it be deleted from the report.

Your Committee recommends that the Forest Service, at the next session of the Legislature, submit a report regarding the implementation of the recommendations so that a further review can be undertaken.

Consideration on the Total Management Responsibility of the Quota Holders within any Sustained-vield Unit Which Has Been Cut to the Maximum Allowable Harvest under Close Utilization Standards.—Your Committee received one representation on this subject and, from the lack of submissions, it is the opinion that the matter is not a contentious one.

Your Committee recommends that a further study of this matter be undertaken next year.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

Mr. Speaker delivered a reserved decision as follows:—

Honourable Members,—At the opening of the sitting this afternoon I reserved my decision on an urgency motion raised by the honourable member for Kootenay and have now had the opportunity to consider the statement handed to me in accordance with Standing Order 35 (3) together with the reply of the Honourable the Attorney-General respecting the present hearing before the Canadian Transport Commission in regard to an application by the Kootenay and Elk Railway Company to connect with the Great Northern Railway Company at the United States border. I have also examined a copy of an Order in Council No. 332, handed to me in support of the motion for adjournment.

The duty of the Chair is to determine the urgency of debate at this particular time on the motion concerned, not the urgency of the matter itself, and an examination of the rules applicable to motions under our Standing Order 35 reveals that, in order to qualify, the matter sought to be raised must be of recent occurrence and raised without delay. May's 16th edition, at page 370, states that, "the fact that new information has been received regarding a matter that has been continuing for some time does not in itself make the matter one of urgency." Again, at page 370, it is further observed that, "if the facts have only been recently revealed that does not make the occurrence recent."

The relevant Order in Council is dated February 2, 1970, and the reply of the Honourable the Attorney-General above referred to is dated March 13, 1970. Whether or not the said reply or the Order in Council were only recently revealed to the honourable member is, in my opinion, quite irrelevant in view of the parliamentary authority quoted.

It is also clear that while certain facts may have come to the honourable member's attention only recently, the subject matter with which we are concerned has been continuing for some time and the urgency of debate at this particular time has not been established.

Accordingly, I must rule the motion out of order.

His Honour was pleased in Her Majesty's name to give assent to the said Bills.

The said assent was announced by E. K. DeBeck, Esquire, Clerk of the House, in the following words:—

"In Her Majesty's name, His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor doth assent to these Bills."

Then Mr. Speaker addressed the Lieutenant-Governor as follows:—

#### MAY IT PLEASE YOUR HONOUR:

We, Her Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects, the Legislative Assembly of the Province of British Columbia, in Session assembled, approach Your Honour at the close of our labours with sentiments of unfeigned devotion and loyalty to Her Majesty's person and Government and humbly beg to present for Your Honour's acceptance Bill (No. 85) intituled An Act for Granting Certain Sums of Money for the Public Service of the Province of British Columbia.

To this Bill the Deputy Clerk of the Legislative Assembly, by His Honour's command, did thereupon say:—

"In Her Majesty's name, His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor doth thank Her Majesty's loyal subjects, accept their benevolence, and assent to this Bill."

Then His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor was pleased to deliver the following gracious Speech:—

Mr. Speaker and Members of the Legislative Assembly:

Your deliberations during this First Session of the Twenty-ninth Parliament of British Columbia have been of great benefit to the citizens of this Province. I express my appreciation for your achievements.

The legislation enacted at this Session has continued to provide increased financial benefits for all citizens through a number of significant measures. Amendments have been made to the *Municipal Treatment Plant Assistance Act* to make it easier for municipalities to qualify for assistance under the Act.

The Province's grant to municipalities has been increased by \$2 per capita for social services in the municipality, making a total of \$30 per capita under the Municipalities Aid Act.

Supplementary to the assistance presently provided for the purchase or construction of a new home, the *Provincial Home-acquisition Grant Act* gives assistance to a tenant toward the purchase of an existing home. A tenant now has the option of a grant of \$1,000 or a loan of \$5,000 for a new home, or a grant of \$500 or a loan of \$2,500 for the purchase of an existing home. The *Provincial Home-owner Grant Act* provides for increases of \$10 per home, for a total of \$160 per home.

Authority has been given to invest up to thirty-five million dollars (\$35,000,000) in the unissued stock of Pacific Great Eastern Railway, which will enable the railway to make provision for substantial new construction and expansion of services to the people. Provision has also been made for increasing the borrowing authority of this railway company by fifty million dollars (\$50,000,000) for the same purposes.

Likewise, the British Columbia Hydro and Power Authority has been given authority to expand its borrowing by two hundred and fifty million dollars (\$250,000,000) to allow for expansion of its facilities throughout the Province. Under the Succession Duty Act the exemptions under the Act have been increased for annuities from \$1,200 to \$3,000 per annum and a family home has been completely exempted from succession duties.

Great advances have been made during this Session in the enactments relating to the administration of justice. A completely new *Corrections Act* and *Jury Act* have been enacted, providing the most advanced legislation in these fields. Amendments to the *Supreme Court Act* and the *Land Registry Act* have streamlined the operation of the courts and land registry systems.

A new Motion Pictures Act provides the legislative framework for a practical and enlightened system of film classification and review. A new Part II of the Landlord and Tenant Act has been enacted, which brings the law of landlord and tenant out of the Middle Ages and into the era of modern urban life and it will resolve many of the problems and inequities of this field of the law. The Motorvehicle Act has again been amended to deal with constantly changing problems of our automobile culture, including the problem of air pollution caused by automobiles.

One of the most significant measures enacted by this House was the Age of Majority Act, which reduced the age of majority from twenty-one years to nineteen years for all purposes. This legislation is unique in Canada and will have far-reaching benefits for our young citizens.

In the field of labour relations, the benefits of the *Payment of Wages Act* have been extended to all persons instead of to a scheduled list of industries. Provision has also been made for accreditation of employer associations under the *Labour Relations Act* so that collective bargaining will be assisted and improved.

In a substantial change of emphasis, the Department of Social Welfare has been converted into a Department of Rehabilitation and Social Improvement. Likewise, amendments have been made to the Adoption Act and the Protection of Children Act to improve the achievement of the objects of these Acts in the areas

of foreign and adult adoptions and of delinquency problems.

The natural resources, a great heritage of the Province, have received the careful attention of this Assembly. A completely new and revised Land Act has been enacted, providing for an intelligent and practical administration of all Crown lands of the Province. Likewise, the Forest Act has been amended to improve the administration of the timber reserves of the Province and to provide for the use of forest lands as recreational areas in certain cases and the regulations pertaining to such use. The Mineral Act has been changed to provide that Crown-granted mineral claims previously acquired cannot result in the acquisition of surface rights unless the Minister of Mines and Petroleum Resources is satisfied that the mineral claims are being used for mining purposes. Under a new Mineral Processing Act minerals produced in the Province must hereafter be available to be processed in the Province when required by the Minister. This Act sets up a Board of Arbitration whereby disputes between owners and producers of minerals and the processors can be resolved.

In the field of health services the Mental Health Act and the Medical Act have been amended and changes in the Hospital Act, Regional Hospital Districts Act, and the Vancouver General Hospital Act, 1902, have dealt with many of the problem areas arising out of concern for the health and hospital services for all citizens of the Province.

Pollution control and its increasing concomitant problems have occupied the attention and careful consideration of the members of the Legislature this Session. Provision has been made for control of air pollution through substantial amendments to the *Pollution Control Act*, 1967, and the *Motor-vehicle Act*, previously referred to. The problems of land and water pollution have resulted in new provisions dealing with the subjects in the *Pollution Control Act*, 1967, and in a new *Litter Act*, the latter legislation governing the disposal of domestic wastes and litter. Complementary provisions are also to be found in the *Land Act* and in the *Forest Act*.

The Assembly has given full consideration to the problems of local government. In addition to the financial measures for the assistance of municipalities, previously alluded to, a new Municipal Finance Authority of British Columbia Act has

been passed for the purpose of providing financial assistance and marketing of securities of the Authority in aid of the municipalities and regional districts in the Province. Furthermore, substantial amendments have been made to the *Municipal Act* and the *Municipalities Enabling and Validating Act* to enlarge the scope and responsibilities of regional districts and to provide other benefits to the municipalities.

The *Public Schools Act* has been amended to set up a completely integrated system of colleges and to provide for its governance and administration for the improvement of post-secondary education in the Province.

Your approval of the Supply Bill, authorizing expenditures in services for our people exceeding one billion, one hundred and sixty-five million dollars (\$1,165,000,000), without any increase in taxation, is particularly praiseworthy.

These and many other measures which you have carefully considered and authorized will contribute substantially to the growth and continued prosperity of the Province and the happiness and well-being of our citizens.

Members of the Legislative Assembly, I thank you for your earnest deliberations and labours and for the supply which you have granted for the public service. Honourable Members, I now relieve you of your legislative duties, and I trust that the blessing of Divine Providence will accompany you to your respective homes.

The Hon. W. D. Black (Provincial Secretary) then said:—

Mr. Speaker and Members of the Legislative Assembly:

It is His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor's will and pleasure that the Legislative Assembly be prorogued until it shall please the Lieutenant-Governor to summon the same for dispatch of business, and this Provincial Legislative Assembly is hereby prorogued accordingly.
