This being the first day of the second meeting of the Twenty-ninth Parliament or Legislative Assembly of the Province of British Columbia for the dispatch of business, pursuant to a Proclamation of Colonel the Honourable John R. Nicholson, P.C., O.B.E., Q.C., LL.D., Lieutenant-Governor of the Province, dated the 5th day of October 1970, the members took their seats.

Prayers by the Rev. G. H. Pousett.

Colonel the Honourable John R. Nicholson, P.C., O.B.E., Q.C., LL.D., Lieutenant-Governor of the Province, having entered the House, took his seat on the Throne, and was pleased to deliver the following gracious Speech:

Mr. Speaker and Members of the Legislative Assembly:

I welcome you to the Second Session of the Twenty-ninth Parliament of British Columbia, confident that you will discharge your duties carefully and that lasting benefits will accrue for the benefit of all our people from your deliberations.

We have already embarked upon the fitting commemoration of the centenary of our entry into Confederation. While that momentous change in our constitutional status occurred on July 20, 1871, may I recall to your attention that one hundred years ago yesterday the Legislative Council of the Colony of British Columbia, having endorsed the terms of union which had been revised by our delegates in consort with the Federal authorities, approved an Address to Her Majesty Queen Victoria expressing the desire of the Colony to join the Canadian Confederation.

Pursuant to the provisions of the British Columbia Centennial '71 Celebrations Act, elaborate plans have been prepared for our commemoration of this significant event. Hundreds of our communities have completed or are in the process of completing permanent projects which will add appreciably to the facilities available to our people for their use and enjoyment. Already our calendar of events is full to overflowing, assuring our people ample opportunity to share to the full in this eventful commemoration.

Her Majesty the Queen has graciously consented to visit with her people in British Columbia between May 3rd and May 12th, and by her presence to join with us in our celebrations. Her Majesty will be accompanied by His Royal High-

ness the Duke of Edinburgh and Her Royal Highness the Princess Anne. Centennial '71 promises to be a gala year in the life of this great Province.

During the past year my Government welcomed ambassadors and distinguished visitors from many countries, evidence of the growing interest in our Province. This comes as no surprise when it is remembered that British Columbia in terms of population is the fastest-growing Province in Canada, having increased by a third in the last decade alone. It is predicted that early in the 21st Century we will approach

Ontario and Quebec in population alone.

My Government continues to be concerned not only with the present and future prospects of our Province but also with the preservation of our historical heritage and traditions. The Provincial Archives now occupies its splendid new facility in Heritage Court, and in consequence of its transfer plans are in process for the expansion of the facilities and services of the Provincial Library. Development of both the Barkerville and Fort Steele Historic Parks goes on apace, and on the basis of attendance figures alone ample proof is given of the interest and appreciation of the people of our Province. The restoration of Craigflower Manor, under a joint Federal-Provincial agreement, is now completed, and during our Centennial year it will be officially opened. Under a similar agreement, the restoration of Fort St. James is under active planning, and this new historic park will officially be dedicated this year.

During 1970, British Columbia experienced a difficult year for a variety of reasons. The many labour-management contracts coming under negotiation and the lock-outs and strikes in both the Federal and Provincial jurisdictions seriously affected the economy of the Province. The policy of the Federal Government in relation to tight money and high interest rates, as well as increased prices, resulted in increased unemployment. The decision of the Federal Government to unpeg the Canadian dollar further compounded our problems, since we are necessarily dependent upon the export market. However, we enter the Centennial year and the decade of the '70's with faith, courage, and optimism. By its progressive policies, my Government will continue to seek to improve the quality of life of all citizens of this Province.

The main and foremost policy of my Government is directed to the improvement of the total environment of its citizens to the end that they shall all enjoy the best ecological climate in the world. Already considerable advances have been made in pollution control. By statutory enactments last year, motor-vehicles manufactured after January 1, 1971 and licensed in British Columbia were required to conform with detailed standards of pollution control, and new industries established in this Province in 1971 were required to meet standards of industrial air-pollution control. Every effort is being made to speedily reduce the backlog of existing pollution control problems.

A broad approach to the general matter of ecological balance of the environment has been made through the Land Use Committee, chaired by the Minister of Lands, Forests, and Water Resources, and comprised of the Ministers of Agriculture, Mines and Petroleum Resources, Municipal Affairs, and Recreation and Conservation. Arrangements are now being made to bring an even broader scope of opinion and advice to the vital question of environmental management in the Province by the inclusion on the committee of the Minister of Health Services and Hospital Insurance.

In consequence of legislation approved last year, better relationships now exist between landlords and tenants.

I am pleased to report that the Age of Majority Act has met with general approval and is proving beneficial to the young people of this Province. At my Gov-

ernment's request, the end of juvenile age under the Federal *Juvenile Delinquents Act* was lowered from the 18th to the 17th birthday.

A Judicial Council, under the chairmanship of Judge Cyril White, has been appointed under the *Provincial Court Act*. Improvements in the administration of justice will continue to be made through altered procedures and rules of practice designed to reduce delay and inconvenience.

The Law Reform Commission has formulated a programme of study covering many fields of law. It is anticipated that the first product of its study will be pre-

sented to you for consideration.

The forest resource industries of British Columbia did not experience their customary growth in several sectors in 1970. Present projections indicate that the timber cut is up only 3.2 per cent over 1969. By the end of 1970, lumber production was down 4.1 per cent over 1969. This is attributable in large part to depressed lumber markets at home and abroad, to strikes within the towing and forest industries, and to forest closures made necessary by extreme fire hazard. The 1970 fire season was in many respects the worst in history. The direct cost of fighting the 3,982 forest fires was close to \$9 million, but fortunately the acreage burned was less than the 10-year average. The slowdown in housing construction, general throughout North America, affected the output of related lumber products, but there are indications of a more buoyant market.

Pulp and paper production ran about 5 per cent lower that the previous year, but again demand has almost overtaken capacity and with recent price increases the outlook has brightened.

Our forest resource industries continue to attract vast sums of capital. Several new plants opened in 1970, others are in the construction stage, and existing plants are being extended. Our sustained-yield and close-utilization policies are being more widely enforced.

My Government continues its efforts to plan and make available our water resources for social betterment and economic growth. The rehabilitation of irrigation and flood-control works continues under joint Federal-Provincial programmes.

Work continues in the development of hydro-electric power on the Peace and Columbia Rivers. The continuing expansion predicted for British Columbia's economy presents a major challenge for the British Columbia Hydro and Power Authority.

A number of studies have been initiated to determine not only the most economical but also the most environmentally acceptable means of meeting the load growth. Protection of the natural environment has become one of the most important challenges of the decade, and British Columbia Hydro will continue to utilize sources of power which do not adversely affect the natural environment of our Province. It is fortunate that almost 90 per cent of the power produced by British Columbia Hydro in 1970 was generated at hydro-electric installations, the most pollution-free of all systems for supplying energy.

The construction of Mica Dam, the last of the three Columbia River Treaty projects in British Columbia, is progressing favourably. Progress is also being made on the redevelopment of several existing generating stations. Further expansions of the Peace River generating facilities, which already provide more than 48 per cent of British Columbia Hydro's power, are planned for 1971 and 1972.

Transmission and distribution facilities continued to expand during the past year, including extensions to a number of remote and sparsely populated areas. The latter were made economically possible by my Government's rural electrification annual grant to British Columbia Hydro.

My Government is pleased to report that the mineral industry shows no sign of diminishing activity. During the year, eight different mining companies announced their intention to bring eight new metal mines into production, with a total rated treatment capacity in the order of 55,000 tons of ore per day. Activity in oil and gas exploration continued on a level similar to that in 1969. Although no new major fields of oil or natural gas were discovered during the year, developed reserves at the end of 1969 were 252,860,000 stock barrels of oil and 7.8 trillion standard cubic feet of residue gas.

I am pleased to advise you that a new ARDA agreement has been signed with the Federal Government which extends to 1975 and raises the Federal contribution to \$2 million per year. The Canada Land Inventory programme continues; three areas of high priority have been completed and the scientific maps are of considerable benefit to the Land Use Committee.

The Agricultural Aid to Developing Countries and World Disaster Fund continue to serve a useful purpose in meeting emergency situations as they occur around the world. It is hoped that their use may be extended to provide scholarships for persons to attend schools in underdeveloped regions, and to this end discussions are proceeding with the Canadian International Development Agency.

My Government continues to exert every effort to expand the international trade of this Province, an activity vital to the strengthening of our industrial base. Trade through customs ports set another new record during 1970. The Federal Government is being approached for increased development and incentive grants to foster industrial growth in all geographical areas, but particularly in the Interior and more northerly regions. We continue to press for the release of Federal funds for housing and the reduction in mortgage interest rates which would have the effect of releasing larger sums from the private sector to enable persons with more modest incomes to own their own homes.

You will recall that last year you were informed of plans for our participation in Expo '70 at Osaka, Japan. I am pleased to report that the British Columbia pavilion was an outstanding success. Rated among the top five foreign pavilions, over 4,000 visitors per hour toured our building and approximately 14,000 were present for our daily film presentations.

My Government will again sponsor the British Columbia International Trade Fair to be held at the Pacific National Exhibition grounds in Vancouver from June 2nd to 12th this year.

My Government is conscious of its responsibility through the provisions of the *Motor Carrier Act* to provide the maximum protection for properly licensed carriers. Regulations relating to pipe-line construction standards and aerial tramways will be revised to ensure greater safety.

The railway from Cloverdale to Roberts Bank superport was completed in 1970, and the British Columbia Hydro and Power Authority trackage east of Cloverdale was upgraded.

Concentrating on the development of our northern resources, the Pacific Great Eastern Railway in 1970 increased the tempo of new line construction and moved, in record volume, an ever-expanding variety of commodities. Despite the restraining effect of an unsettled economy, carloadings and revenues reached the highest levels in the railway's history. To move the vast natural resources of northern British Columbia to domestic and world markets, work was in progress during the past year on nearly 700 miles of new extensions. It is anticipated that both the extension from Fort St. James to Takla Lake and from Fort St. John to Fort Nelson will be

opened for traffic during our Centennial '71 celebrations. Good progress has been made on the extension from Takla Lake to Dease Lake, which should be completed by 1974.

The extension and improvement of the highway system of this Province continues to be a prime concern to my Government. A start has been made on the new 80-mile highway linking Kelsey Bay with Beaver Cove on northern Vancouver Island, and the first portion of the Cowichan Valley road was opened last fall. Good progress has been made on widening of the Patricia Bay Highway from Victoria to Swartz Bay to four lanes, and the first contracts have been called for the reconstruction of the Trans-Canada Highway between Horseshoe Bay and Taylor Way in West Vancouver to full four-lane, freeway standards. Among other projects either completed or nearly completed were a 12-mile section on the Yellowhead Route near Prince Rupert and 26 miles on the Cariboo Highway. Work continues on the extension of the Lougheed Highway east of Agassiz and widening it in the Haney area. Despite the delays arising from the construction industry dispute, progress is being made on two major bridges over the Fraser River—at Knight Road in Vancouver and at Mission.

My Government is pleased to report that traffic on all 12 routes of the British Columbia Ferries Division increased during the past year. The second "stretch" ferry, *Queen of Victoria*, was brought into service last year. To cope with increased traffic, necessary alterations to terminals are continuing.

During the past decade it became obvious to my Government that there would be a great demand in modern society for technically trained people, and that facilities should be constructed in which students could obtain the type of training of benefit to themselves and to the communities in which they live. It becomes increasingly more apparent that, in order to obtain employment in the resource-based industries of our Province, workmen would require special skills and expert training. My Government, therefore, embarked on an ambitious programme of diversifying our post-secondary education facilities. During the past year the wisdom of this policy was proven by the large number of students who received their training in our vocational schools and colleges and who, in consequence, are now qualified to take their place in the industrial development of our Province.

During the course of this past year over 36,000 students received training in the nine vocational schools located throughout the Province. During 1970, vocational schools were officially opened at Victoria and Terrace. Financed by Federal and Provincial funds, these two schools alone cost over \$9 million, and annually enrol about 3,000 students. The new vocational school at Kamloops is proceeding on schedule and should be operational this year. A vocational school in the Chilliwack area has been approved and it is hoped construction will start this year.

Great progress has also been made in the development of colleges by College Councils with the co-operation of School Boards throughout the Province. Cariboo College, near Kamloops, and Douglas College, in the Lower Fraser Valley, were opened during 1970 and Vancouver City College moved to its new \$8-million Langara campus. Approval has been given to the Greater Victoria School Board to operate a new college to serve students from the southern part of Vancouver Island, commencing in September of this year. Whereas a short five years ago only 2,500 students were enrolled in one college, I am pleased to be able to report that this year 12,000 students were enrolled in eight colleges.

It is the policy of my Government that these postsecondary facilities shall be so located that students desiring to obtain higher education may take their initial two-year academic programmes or vocational training close to home.

My Government is not unmindful of the need for continuing support for our universities. All three of our public universities are contributing to the welfare of the citizens of the Province.

While great progress has taken place in the postsecondary field of education, the public school system continues to grow at a rapid pace. Over half a million students are now enrolled in our public schools. During 1970 over 800 classrooms were added, and an additional 890 new classrooms are projected to be built this year.

Under the leadership provided by the Library Development Commission, a fiveyear plan for public library development is being finalized. A new formula for grants-in-aid is now in effect which substantially increases the financial assistance given to individual small libraries. I am pleased to be able to report that there is

growing acceptance of the principle of regional library service.

My Government pursues a sound, modern system of personnel administration for the public service. It is deeply conscious of the high quality of its Civil Service, and is appreciative of its loyal support. You will be asked to consider amendments to the Civil Service Superannuation Act, the Municipal Superannuation Act, the Teachers' Pensions Act, and the School District and Regional Colleges (Pensions)

During the past year some 350 tasks were carried out by Civil Defence, many of which were in direct aid in emergencies involving the safety of human life and in support of local authorities in civil emergency situations.

You will be asked to consider amendments to the Provincial Elections Act.

My Government continues to improve the building facilities for public service through the Province. The Government Building and Law Courts at Duncan are completed, and one at Williams Lake will soon be opened. Planning continues for buildings in several centres throughout the Province. Extensive renovations to the Vancouver Law Courts have been carried out as part of a continuing programme to increase Court facilities. Service facilities for the Department of Highways have been completed at Quesnel, Williams Lake, Salmon Arm, and 100 Mile House.

British Columbia at mid-July 1970 led all Canada in the increase in its labour force, rising by 6.4 per cent, continuing a trend throughout the decade of the '60's. During that period our labour force rose by 55.2 per cent, compared to increases of 19.8 per cent in the Atlantic Provinces, of 29.0 per cent in Quebec, of 31.7 per cent in Ontario, and of 24.2 per cent in the Prairie Provinces. Of equal significance is the fact that during the same decade British Columbia increased the number of its labour force gainfully employed more rapidly than elsewhere in Canada. In the Atlantic Provinces the increase was 23.8 per cent; in Quebec, 30.7 per cent; in Ontario, 33.2 per cent; in the Prairie Provinces, 24.0 per cent; but in our Province the increase was 57.2 per cent.

Although my Government found it necessary to invoke the final and binding provisions of the Mediation Commission Act in a few instances, it is convinced that free collective bargaining is the best means of achieving peaceful and harmonious relations. Nevertheless, in cases where the public interest and welfare are seriously affected, that interest must be paramount and take precedence over the desires of any particular segment of the population.

I am pleased to report that effective the first of this year the maximum wage on which Workmen's Compensation payments are based was raised from \$6,600 to \$7,600. In consequence, the monthly compensation for work-caused injuries has risen from \$412.50 to \$475, the highest in Canada. Disability pensions and compensation payments for time lost through industrial injuries have likewise been increased.

The Workmen's Compensation Board of British Columbia will be sponsoring the largest joint Management-Labour Safety Conference ever held in Canada in June of this year in Vancouver. More than 1,000 delegates are expected to attend. My Government congratulates both labour and management for demonstrating this spirit of co-operation and dedication in seeking means to reduce the incidence of death and injury in industry throughout the Province. As part of its programme to celebrate the centenary of the entry of British Columbia into Confederation, the Workmen's Compensation Board will also be co-operating with the Council of the Order of St. John in hosting the world's largest international First Aid Competition. First aid teams from all 10 provinces and the two northern territories will compete along with teams from a number of American states and Mexico. This competition will assist in maintaining the high standards of efficiency in industrial first aid for which this Province is so well known. Along with the Provincial Senior First Aid Championships, boys and girls from all regions of the Province will be competing in the junior events of this Centennial project.

My Government is anxious that municipal by-laws and regulations serve the purpose of facilitating expansion of residential housing programmes. You will be asked to approve the standardization and co-ordination of housing regulations.

My Government is co-operating in the purchase of land and the development of a Botanical Garden in Vancouver, which will be of great significance to the Province and Canada's third largest city.

The continued rapid growth of the visitor industry has materially benefited the economy of this Province. The dollar value of this industry has passed the 470-million mark, having doubled in less than six years, and further expansion of all types of facilities is being encouraged.

You will be asked to consider measures to enhance the protection of rare and endangered wildlife species and to improve the protection of wildlife and wildlife habitat generally. Further control over the recreational use of firearms and all terrain vehicles will be recommended for your consideration.

In 1970 the extension of community programmes in the field of mental health was furthered with the opening of two new mental health centres at Nelson and Terrace, bringing to 17 the number of such centres in British Columbia. Approximately 19,000 patients were cared for by mental health facilities, an increase of 19 per cent over 1969. Most of this increase was in out-patient care.

The final phases of construction of the 300-bed Glendale Hospital, Victoria, are proceeding on schedule and will be operational early this year. Renovation and planning programmes continue at Skeenaview Hospital, Terrace; at Riverview Hospital; at The Woodlands School; and at The Tranquille School.

Actions taken by the Public Health Services have increased further the protection of the public against disease and other disabling conditions.

You will be asked to consider amendments to the *Health Act* to authorize new Communicable Disease Regulations, to permit charges for services provided by Health Services laboratories, to provide for the appointment of medical health officers for the Province as a whole rather than for the presently defined geographic areas, and to permit regional districts to appoint representatives to Union Boards of Health. Amendments to the *Marriage Act* will also be presented to you. To permit the transfer of community-care facilities from the Department of Rehabilitation and Social Improvement to the Department of Health Services and Hospital Insurance, amendments to the *Community Care Facilities Act* will also be placed before you.

Inflation, high unemployment, and the migration of individuals and families to British Columbia in search of employment and a better life were three socio-economic factors which contributed to sharply rising demands for social services and income maintenance to persons in need.

My Government, fully cognizant of these facts, took appropriate action. Social Allowance rates were increased, as were earning exemptions for mothers with dependent children, handicapped family heads, employable persons making continued and continuing efforts to find full-time employment, and persons receiving Disabled Persons' Allowances. Boarding and nursing homes rates for indigents were increased twice in 1970. The allowable income for persons receiving Supplementary Social Allowance to Old Age Security was also adjusted.

I am pleased to be able to report that amendments to the *Protection of Children Act* are working well and have resulted in more effective use of public and private child-care facilities and improvement of services to children.

During the past year, administrative changes providing programme, fiscal, and operational controls were instituted. To ensure the best service possible to our senior citizens, the administration of Supplementary Social Allowance to Old Age Security was decentralized to local offices. The Provincial Alliance of Businessmen became a branch of the Department of Rehabilitation and Social Improvement, ensuring co-ordination of services, financial eligibility, and job-finding sections of the Department.

The *Public Accounts* and reports of the departments of my Government will be presented to you, and estimates for the ensuing year will be submitted.

Mr. Speaker and Honourable Members, I now leave you and trust that in your deliberations the guidance of Divine Providence will attend you in your labours.

His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor was then pleased to retire.

The Speaker reported that, to prevent mistakes, he had obtained a copy of His Honour's Speech.

On the motion of the Hon. L. R. Peterson, Bill (No. 1) intituled An Act to Amend the Reciprocal Enforcement of Maintenance Orders Act was introduced, read a first time, and Ordered to be placed on the Orders of the Day for second reading at the next sitting after today.

On the motion of the Hon. W. A. C. Bennett, seconded by the Hon. L. R. Peterson, it was Ordered—

That the appointment of Gerald Herbert Cross. Q.C., of Victoria, as Acting Clerk Assistant of the Legislative Assembly in place of Earle George MacMinn during the year 1971, approved by His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor by and with the advice of His Executive Council on the 22nd day of December 1970, and effective on the 15th day of January 1971, be now ratified pursuant to the provisions of section 44 of the Constitution Act, being chapter 71 of the Revised Statutes of British Columbia, 1960.

On the motion of the Hon. W. A. C. Bennett, seconded by the Hon. W. D. Black, it was Ordered—

That the Speech of His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor be taken into consideration at the next sitting of the House, and that this Order have precedence over all other business, except introduction of Bills, until disposed of.

On the motion of the Hon. W. D. Black, seconded by the Hon. L. R. Peterson, it was Ordered—

That the Votes and Proceedings of this House be printed, being first perused by Mr. Speaker, and that he do appoint the printing thereof, and that no person but such as he shall appoint do presume to print the same.

On the motion of the Hon. W. A. C. Bennett, seconded by the Hon. D. L. Brothers, it was Ordered—

That the Select Standing Committees of this House, for the present Session, be appointed for the following purposes:

- 1. On Standing Orders and Private Bills;
- 2. On Public Accounts and Printing;
- 3. On Mining and Railways;
- 4. On Agriculture;
- 5. On Municipal Matters;
- 6. On Forestry and Fisheries;
- 7. On Labour:
- 8. On Social Welfare and Education;

which said Committees shall severally be empowered to examine and inquire into all such matters and things as shall be referred to them by this House, and to report from time to time their observations and opinions thereon, with power to send for persons, papers, and records, and that a Special Committee be appointed to prepare and report, with all convenient speed, lists of members to compose the above Select Standing Committees of this House under Standing Order 68 (1), said Committee to be composed of the Hon. L. R. Peterson, the Hon. W. N. Chant, and Messrs. Bruch, Barrett, and McGeer.

- Mr. L. Isaacson, Mr. E. Kelly, and Mr. D. Smith, representing the Principals' Association of the British Columbia Teachers' Federation.

Your Committee begs leave to present a report as follows:

Your Committee accepts that the function of tenure provisions is to indicate those conditions under which a teacher may be assured of continuing employment by a school district, and that it is desirable that there be such provisions. At the same time, your Committee is of the opinion that it is essential that these provisions apply only to those teachers who have proven themselves capable of performing their duties satisfactorily, and who continue to perform them at that level.

Your Committee is also convinced that there must be some form of review provided in cases of dismissal, but that the particular form of review must be such that it will be concerned more with the substance of the issues involved in the termination of employment than with the details of the manner in which the employment was terminated.

It was agreed by the Committee that a teacher should be notified immediately whenever performance of his duties was evaluated as unsatisfactory; that he should be notified of the improvements considered necessary; and that, if after a reasonable

period of time, he did not effect these improvements, he should be subject to dismissal on the grounds of inefficiency.

The remainder of this report is divided into five sections, under these headings: (1) Probationary Appointments, (2) Grounds for Dismissal, Transfer, and Suspension, (3) Appeals Against Dismissal, (4) Personnel Practices, (5) Availability of Information.

(1) PROBATIONARY APPOINTMENTS

The Committee was informed by representatives of the British Columbia School Trustees' Association, the British Columbia Teachers' Federation, and the British Columbia Parent-Teachers' Federation that all three groups felt some extension of the present one-year probationary period was indicated. Nevertheless, the Committee believes that there is great value, in emphasizing the importance of careful selection of teachers, in the present one-year probationary appointment. With these points of view in mind, the Committee makes the following recommendation:

- 1. That rules 5.02 and 5.05 be replaced with the following:
- 5.02 Before a notice of termination is given, or before the teacher is reappointed on a second year of probationary appointment to a position in the service of the same Board, the Board shall consider the District Superintendent's report on the teacher concerned, and shall confer with the District Superintendent or, in the case of a teacher in a school to which Section 3.14 of the Rules is applicable, with the principal or the District Superintendent, or both.
- 5.05 When a Board terminates a probationary appointment, or reappoints a teacher pursuant to Rule 5.02, it shall inform him of the reasons for the action of the Board. Such information shall, at the written request of the teacher, be supplied in writing.

(2) GROUNDS FOR DISMISSAL, SUSPENSION, AND TRANSFER

Section 129 of the *Public Schools Act* sets forth the grounds for dismissal as "for cause," "for inefficiency or misconduct," and "for gross misconduct." The Committee is of the opinion that the terms "cause," "misconduct," and "gross misconduct" should not be defined in any specific way, since they must, of necessity, provide for a wide variety of situations. However, the Committee feels that "inefficiency" can be, at least partially, defined in terms of repeated reports assessing the work of a teacher as unsatisfactory. It is also of the opinion that the term "gross misconduct" is sufficiently clear that dismissal on this ground should be subject to different procedures both before and after the dismissal. The Committee makes the following recommendations:

- 2. That clause (i) of section 129 of the *Public Schools Act* be amended to read as follows:
 - (i) subject to the regulations and to the provisions of section 134, dismiss a teacher for inefficiency or misconduct at any time during the school-year by giving him thirty days' notice of dismissal, and in such case may recommend to the Minister the cancellation of the certificate of the teacher so dismissed;
 - 3. That the Council of Public Instruction add the following as a Rule:

A teacher may be dismissed for inefficiency pursuant to section 129 (i) upon receipt by the Board of three or more reports indicating that the learning situation in the classes of the teacher is unsatisfactory, issued in accordance with the following:

(a) The three reports shall have been issued in a period of not less than 12 nor more than 24 months:

- (b) One of the reports shall have been written by the District Superintendent of Schools for the school district in which the teacher is employed, or by a Director of Instruction empowered to write reports under the regulations:
- (c) One of the reports shall have been written by another District Superintendent of Schools, appointed by the Department to inspect and report upon the teacher following the receipt of a request made to the Department by the District Superintendent of Schools in paragraph (b):

(d) If the teacher is assigned to a school to which Rule 3.14 is applicable, one of the reports shall have been prepared under that Rule made in conformity with Rule 3.15:

(e) The three reports shall have indicated an assessment of the learning situation and have contained recommendations for improvement.

Recommendation 3 requires that the principal's report provide an assessment of the learning situation. It appears to the Committee that, at present, these reports do not contain such evaluations and it was also drawn to the Committee's attention that the present Rules of the Council of Public Instruction do not specifically authorize or require such evaluations. Since the Committee is of the opinion that the principal of a school will often be the first supervisor to become aware of unsatisfactory performance by a teacher, he should not only have such authority, but should also be required to make evaluations. The Committee therefore recommends:

- 4. That the Council of Public Instruction revise Rule 3.15 by adding clauses (d) and (e) to require that
 - (d) the (principal's) report contain an assessment of the learning situation in the teacher's classes and recommendations for improvement therein;
 - (e) the report, at the specific request of either the District Superintendent of Schools or the Board, contain a statement that, in the opinion of the principal, the learning situation is satisfactory or unsatisfactory;

and further, that Rules 3.14 and 3.17 be revised to remove any implication that a principal may report only once a year.

5. That the present provision in clause (j) of section 129, concerning summary dismissal, be retained, but that the following words be added "and such dismissal is not subject to section 134, but the teacher shall have the right to appeal to the County Court."

Since the Committee is of the opinion that suspension should be a temporary measure invoked only during the investigative phases of a complaint which could lead to dismissal, it has made certain recommendations regarding suspension in the recommended amendments to section 134 of the *Public Schools Act*. Recommendations which will make provisions concerning transfer more flexible are made in the same amendments.

(3) APPEALS AGAINST DISMISSAL

Submissions by both the British Columbia School Trustees' Association and British Columbia Teachers' Federation questioned the value of the present Investigation Committee procedure established in section 134 of the *Public Schools Act*. The Committee gained the impression that this device, regardless of its original intent, had become formal and rigid in application, and of little value in resolving tenure disputes. The Committee feels that, if such is the case, this procedure may well serve to increase, rather than diminish, the tensions that may surround a proposed dismissal, and becomes merely a preliminary hearing preceding a Board of Reference.

The Committee is convinced that some less formal procedure must be introduced, and concurs with the British Columbia Teachers' Federation that the proper

time for such a development is before an actual dismissal has taken place. The Committee is also of the opinion that the appeal procedures themselves must be revised, and that appeals must be considered by a continuing body which will be able to develop suitable educational criteria. The Committee's proposals are detailed in the following recommendations for re-enactment of sections 134 and 135 of the *Public Schools Act*:

Re-enacts s. 134.

Section 134 is repealed and the following is substituted:

Notice of intention to dismiss, transfer, or terminate.

134. (1) Except as otherwise provided in this Act, the Board of a school district shall, at least thirty days prior to the issuance of a notice of dismissal, transfer, or a termination pursuant to clause (*f1*) of section 129, send the teacher by registered mail written notice of intention of dismissal, transfer, or termination.

Interview with Board.

- (2) Every teacher who has received a notice of intention issued in accordance with subsection (1), or who has received notice that he is suspended pursuant to clause (m) of section 129, may, within five days of receipt of such notice, request an interview by the Board, by delivering or sending by registered mail a written request for a hearing to the Board.
- (3) The Board shall, upon receipt of a request pursuant to subsection (2), grant the teacher, within twenty days, an interview, either by the Board, or by a committee of the Board and such officers of the Board as the Board may direct, and the teacher shall have the right to be accompanied during the interview by a member of his profession.
- (4) If the Board directs that the interview shall be by a committee, the Board shall consider the report of the committee, before issuing any notice of dismissal, transfer, or termination pursuant to clause (fI) of section 129, to the teacher who has requested the hearing.
- (5) Any notice of dismissal, transfer, or termination pursuant to clause (11) of section 129 issued to a teacher who has requested an interview shall be sent by registered mail.

Action following suspension. (6) A Board which has suspended a teacher pursuant to clause (m) of section 129 shall, within seven days of the interview under subsection (3), reinstate the teacher, or take action to dismiss the teacher pursuant to section 129.

Salary to be paid.

(7) A teacher shall receive his salary for the period during which he is under suspension, unless the Board subsequently dismisses him in accordance with subsection (6), and such dismissal shall not require a notice of intention under subsection (1), or an interview under subsection (3).

Appeal by request.

(8) A teacher who has received a notice of dismissal issued by a Board may, not later than five days after the receipt of the notice, appeal from the action of the Board to a Review Panel appointed pursuant to section 135 by sending by registered mail, addressed to the Department and accompanied by a deposit in the amount of one hundred and fifty dollars, a request for an investigation of the dismissal, including reasons for the request, and by sending by registered mail to the Board a copy of the request for investigation.

Transferred teacher may resign.

(9) Every teacher who has been transferred by a Board may, notwithstanding any other provisions of this Act, if he has requested an interview pursuant to subsection (2), and if he does not wish to accept the transfer, resign upon thirty days' notice.

Statement by Board.

(10) The Board shall, not later than five days after the receipt of the notice of the request for investigation from the teacher, send by registered

mail to the teacher and to the Department a full statement of the reasons for the notice of dismissal, accompanied by a deposit in the amount of one hundred and fifty dollars.

Procedure.

- (11) After consideration of such evidence as it may consider relevant, and in accordance with the provisions of section 135, the Review Panel may allow the appeal and make an order for the immediate reinstatement of the teacher, may also make such recommendations as it considers advisable, and shall notify the Board, the teacher, and the Department of its decision and recommendations.
- (12) If the Board does not comply with the provisions of subsection (10), the appeal of the teacher shall be allowed, and his deposit shall be returned to him.

Payment to Consolidated Revenue.

- (13) If the appeal of the teacher is allowed, his deposit shall be returned to him and the deposit of the Board shall be paid into the Consolidated Revenue Fund.
- (14) If the action of the Board is confirmed, the deposit of the Board shall be returned to the Board, and the deposit of the teacher shall be paid into the Consolidated Revenue Fund.

Re-enacts s.135. Section 135 is repealed and the following is substituted:

Duties of Review Panels.

135. (1) A Review Panel established under this section shall investigate appeals under subsection (8) of section 134.

Notification by Department.

(2) Upon receipt of a notice of appeal under subsection (8) of section 134, the Department shall immediately direct the appeal to the chairman of such one of the Review Panels as the Minister shall deem appropriate.

Appointment of Review Panels.

- (3) The Minister shall appoint, at such times as he shall determine, such number of Review Panels as he shall consider necessary, in accordance with the following provisions:
 - (a) Each Review Panel shall consist of a Chairman appointed by the Minister, one member appointed by the Minister from two persons nominated by the British Columbia School Trustees' Association, and one member from two persons nominated by the British Columbia Teachers' Federation, provided also that all persons nominated and appointed shall be persons actively engaged in the practice of education in British Columbia as evidenced by appointment to the staff of a Board, a college or university, or some other educational institution;

(b) The term of appointment shall be for not less than one year nor more than three years, provided that no person shall hold appointment for more than six consecutive years.

- (4) If either party fails to notify the Minister of its nominees within fourteen days of receipt of his request for such nominees or if both parties fail so to notify the Minister, the Minister shall appoint suitable persons as members of the Review Panel on behalf of the party that failed to nominate a member.
- (5) Any person employed by a Board, a college council, or a university who is appointed pursuant to subsection (3) shall be granted leave of absence with full salary to permit him to carry out his duties on the Review Panel, provided that the Board, college council, or university shall be reimbursed as provided in subsections (12), (13), (14), and (15).

(6) The chairman of a Review Panel shall have the same right of voting as the other members of the Review Panel.

Voting by chairman.

(7) All three members of a Review Panel shall be present at the time the panel makes a decision pursuant to subsection (10).

(8) A member of a Review Panel established under this section has the power and privileges of a Commissioner appointed under the *Public Inquiries Act*, and sections 7, 10, and 11 of that Act apply to an appeal under this section.

Evidence to be relevant. (9) No evidence or argument shall be admitted by the Review Panel which is not relevant to the appeal of the teacher, the reasons given by the teacher for his appeal, the statement of reasons for the notice of dismissal given by the Board to the teacher, or the general educational welfare of the pupils in the school district concerned.

Department records.

(10) Review Panels shall have access to those records of the Department which are relevant to the appeal.

Decision.

(11) On the conclusion of its hearing of the appeal, the Review Panel shall confirm the action of the Board, or allow the appeal, and such action is final and binding upon the teacher and the Board.

Remuneration.

- (12) The Lieutenant-Governor in Council shall reimburse a Board, college council, or university for the salary of the chairman for the period of leave of absence granted pursuant to subsection (5), and shall also pay any expenses necessarily incurred by the chairman in the performance of his duties, and such expenses shall include any necessary payments for facilities, equipment, and clerical or related services in connection with the Review Panel.
- (13) The Lieutenant-Governor in Council shall reimburse a Board, college council, or university for the salary of any member appointed pursuant to subsection (4) for the period of leave of absence granted pursuant to subsection (5) and shall also pay any expenses necessarily incurred by that member in the performance of his duties.
- (14) The British Columbia Teachers' Federation shall reimburse a Board, college council, or university for the salary of a member appointed by the Minister pursuant to subsection (3) from persons nominated by it, and shall also pay any expenses necessarily incurred by that member in the performance of his duties.
- (15) The British Columbia School Trustees' Association shall reimburse a Board, college council, or university for the salary of any member appointed pursuant to subsection (4) for the period of leave of absence granted pursuant to subsection (5) and shall also pay any expenses necessarily incurred by that member in the performance of his duties.

The Committee also recommends that section 129 be revised to provide the necessary cross-references to the re-enacted sections.

(4) PERSONNEL PRACTICES

The Committee is fully aware that as the representatives of the British Columbia Parent-Teachers' Federation so succinctly stated, "Good personnel practices cannot be legislated." However, the importance of them cannot be overstated. The Committee draws to the attention of the School Boards of British Columbia, and to the Department of Education, its concerns in connection with the following: Selection of staff, evaluation during probation, notification of concern re quality of work, and role of the principal; and recommends that these matters be reviewed to ensure that sound policies and practices are established.

(5) AVAILABILITY OF INFORMATION

The Committee believes that there is ground for concern about the extent to which information about a teacher's performance is made available to prospective employers and, even within the same district, to the principal of a school to which a teacher may be transferred, or transfer.

The Committee also was concerned at receiving little indication that information concerning the performance of recent graduates of the universities is made available to those institutions so that they may improve their preparation of teachers, and recommends that the Department of Education, the British Columbia School Trustees' Association, and the British Columbia Teachers' Federation develop procedures to ensure that such information is communicated.

Finally, the Committee recommends that the Hon. the Minister of Education be requested to furnish to the Select Standing Committee on Social Welfare and Education, at the next session of the Legislature, a survey of the operations of the recommendations of the Committee.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

Crown grants issued covering Crown lands in the vicinity of Trail and Kimberley contain the following proviso with respect to an easement: 'Provided that out of the Grant hereby made there shall be excepted and reserved unto the Grantor, Her successors and assigns, at all times any and all easements relating to smoke or fumes which may in any way interfere with the enjoyment or occupation of the premises hereby granted or any part thereof arising from any smelter, concentrator, or other industry'."

- 193 Mr. Wenman asked the Hon. the Minister of Lands, Forests, and Water Resources the following questions:
- 1. What are the projected capital and annual operational costs of the primary treatment plant at Annacis Island in Delta?

2. What are the projected capital and annual operational costs of secondary treatment at Annacis Island in Delta?

3. What is the tentative date for secondary treatment plant construction to begin at Annacis Island?

The Hon. R. G. Williston replied as follows:

The primary treatment plant at Annacis Island in Delta will be owned and operated by the Greater Vancouver Sewerage and Drainage District, which has advised that the projected capital and annual operating costs of primary treatment plant at Annacis Island in Delta are \$17,000,000 and \$450,000 respectively.

REPORT No. 1

Legislative Committee Room, March 30, 1971

MR. SPEAKER:

Your Select Standing Committee on Agriculture begs leave to report as follows: Pursuant to motion of February 2, 1971 your Committee was ordered convened to study the following matter:

That this House authorize the Select Standing Committee on Agriculture to

(a) examine the prices of food products sold in British Columbia at the following levels: (i) Producer level, (ii) wholesale level, (iii) retail level, and (iv) processor level, and to evaluate these prices in relation to the inputs or services provided at or between each of these levels;

(b) recommend improved marketing procedures for agricultural products in

British Columbia.

The Committee shall have the power to send for persons, papers, and records and to hear representations from the food and agricultural industry, and such organizations and individuals as may in their discretion appear necessary, and to report its findings and recommendations to this House.

In its study of price spreads at the various stages between producer and consumer the Select Standing Committee on Agriculture conducted nine public hearings at which 16 briefs were presented by individuals and groups representing producers, marketing boards, wholesalers, processors, retailers, and consumers of food and

agricultural products.

There was evidence throughout the hearings that, within the marketing segment, each representative group was attempting to justify its own position and the effectiveness of its role. There was, however, much evidence to indicate that there is no standardized pattern of food marketing. Merchandising of food products throughout the food marketing channels, from producer to consumer, varies from commodity to commodity and is affected by the nature and size of the production segment, the extent to which post-production processing is required, specialty selling, and by the integration of the functions of assembling, wholesaling, and retailing of the commodity.

Each of the many groups involved in food marketing indicated that its role was being discharged efficiently and that its profit margin was minimal. Evidence was also presented from various segments of the food marketing channel that their operations were subject to the full impact of competition in the free marketplace. With the time and facilities available to it, the Committee has been unable to test this evidence, and accordingly can neither accept nor reject it.

On the basis of the evidence presented, the Committee is able to conclude that the financial returns to the primary food producer are low and that, if this segment of the industry is to become viable, means must be found to increase the net returns at the farm level. Failure to provide such upward adjustment in farm net revenue is likely to hasten the disappearance of farmers and farmland, resulting in diminishing control over food prices at the consumer level. The loss of family farms encourages the growth of corporate production organizations, and the Committee is doubtful that production controlled by the corporate farm structure will necessarily lead to lower prices at the consumer level.

On the basis of all of the presentations before it, the Committee concludes that the matters referred to it for study by the Legislature in 1971 should be the subject of an expanded and continuing study under the auspices of the Department of Agriculture.

Accordingly, the Committee recommends that

- (a) appropriate amendments be made to the *Department of Agriculture Act* to rename the Department and broaden its responsibilities as the "Department of Food and Agriculture," with power to administer all of the laws of the Province with respect to the production, processing, distribution, and marketing of food;
- (b) under the authority of the Minister of Food and Agriculture, there be established an agency known as "The British Columbia Food Council," empowered to study, investigate, report, advise, and recommend action in respect of all questions relating to the production and marketing of food;
- (c) the British Columbia Food Council be comprised of representatives from
 the Department of Food and Agriculture, producers, processors, wholesalers, retailers, consumers, and labour, with power to establish advisory
 committees;
- (d) the remuneration of members of the British Columbia Food Council and the expenses incurred in the performance of their duties be fixed and paid by the Lieutenant-Governor in Council.

The Committee recommends that the Government act as quickly as possible to introduce legislation and provide the necessary extra resources for a Department of Food and Agriculture to undertake, on a satisfactory basis, the broadened responsibilities as proposed.

REPORT No. 2

LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE ROOM, March 31, 1971

MR. SPEAKER:

Your Select Standing Committee on Municipal Matters begs leave to report as follows:

Pursuant to motion of March 8, 1971, it was Ordered that Bill (No. 37) intituled Air Space Titles Act be referred to the Select Standing Committee on Munici-

pal Matters.

Three meetings were held in connection with the Bill, and representations were heard from the Architectural Institute of British Columbia, the Canadian Bar Association, Corporation of British Columbia Land Surveyors, Real Estate Institute of British Columbia, and the Insurance Agents' Association of British Columbia. A representation was also received from Mr. Colin D. McQuarrie, Q.C., solicitor for the Union of British Columbia Municipalities.

Your Committee recommends that the Bill be proceeded with, and recommends

the following amendments:

1. Section 1 is amended

(a) by inserting, after the words "volumetric parcel" in clause (a), the words ", whether or not occupied in whole or in part by a building or other structure"; and

(b) by adding before the word "based" in the first line of clause (c) the words "designated by regulation by the Surveyor-General, or".

2. Section 4 is amended by striking out the word "planes" in the fourth line and substituting "surfaces".

3. Section 7 is amended

- (a) by striking out the word "planes" in the first line of clause (a) of subsection (1) and substituting "surfaces"; and
- (b) by striking out the word "and" in the third line of paragraph (i) of clause (f) of subsection (1) of section 7 and substituting "or as otherwise designated by regulation by the Surveyor-General; and"; and

(c) by striking out the words "does not require" in the first line of subsection

(3) and substituting the word "requires".

All of which is respectfully submitted.

- "2. Vancouver General Hospital, eight beds; 220 admissions involving 105 children. Hospitals operating psychiatric wards report that admissions and bed allocations are determined by the hospital medical staff, the attending physician, and the administration according to the diagnosis and state of urgency indicated by the admitting doctor at the time of admission, but without regard to age or sex of the patient. In many hospitals, beds are not specifically designated for any particular disorder or for patients coming within a specified age-group. One hospital reported that certain patients under 16 years of age requiring psychiatric treatment were admitted to a pædiatric ward.
- "3. (a) and (b) No. While no new units are under construction or approved in principle for construction at the present time, a 20-bed unit has been completed at the Eric Martin Institute, Royal Jubilee Hospital, Victoria.
 - "4. See No. 3.
- "5. There has been a request from the British Columbia Centennial Child and Family Psychiatric Centre Committee for a centre which would be located at the University of British Columbia. It is understood that the application has the support of the Board of Governors of the University of British Columbia on the understanding that the project would not involve commitment of university funds.
 - "6. The project is being reviewed by the Department for consideration regard-

less of whether or not it becomes a centennial grant project."

REPORT

LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE ROOM, April 1, 1971

MR. SPEAKER:

Your Select Standing Committee on Forestry and Fisheries begs leave to report as follows:

Pursuant to motion of February 10, 1971 your Committee was ordered convened to study the following matter:

Resolved, That this House authorize the Select Standing Committee on Forestry and Fisheries to receive and study the following reports from the Forest Service:

- (1) The contractor clause in tree-farm licences. This results from a specific recommendation and request made to the Service by the Committee last year:
- (2) Log and debris salvage in the Strait of Georgia. With regard to the second report, specific recommendations should be made concerning debris control in support of the general requirement for the control of such types of pollution.

In the consideration of these matters the Committee shall afford ample opportunity for all interested companies, groups, and individuals to make representations on the matters under study.

Seven meetings were held and representations were heard from the following: Forestry officials, Forest Barge Service Ltd., Gulf Log Salvage Co-op., Foreshore Salvage Ltd., the Council of Forest Industries of British Columbia, British Columbia Wildlife Federation, Vancouver Island Chip Supply Ltd., Bluebird Sawmills Ltd., Air Brake Repairs Ltd., British Columbia Towboat Owners' Association, several independent beachcombers, Lower Mainland Salvage, Truck Loggers' Association, and North Fraser Harbour Commission.

The Forestry Committee appreciates the co-operation of the Forest Service in collecting reports and submitting information on the various subjects.

Study of Specific Recommendations Made to the Legislature in 1970 on the Contractor Clause in Tree-farm Licences

In view of the limited scale returns from contract operations available for the year 1970 the Committee is unable to determine the ultimate effects the recommendations have produced on contracting in tree-farm licences. The Committee views with concern statements made that unions are attempting through contractual agreements with tree-farm licence holders to restrict the operating rights of contractors within tree-farm licences.

Your Committee is of the opinion that the contractor has a contractual right to operate in specific areas in the tree-farm licence, and that this should be allowed to continue without interference.

Your Committee recommends that the Forest Service at the next Session of the Legislature submit a report indicating whether any contractual agreements have been signed between any tree-farm licence holder and a union that might reduce or restrict the rights of contractors in tree-farm licences.

Log and Debris Salvage in the Strait of Georgia

Your Committee is of the opinion that it is evident from submissions and information available that further studies are required to establish sources, ways, and means of overcoming the log and debris problem in the Strait of Georgia.

Your Committee recommends that additional studies be undertaken to establish means of control and disposal of logs and debris. In this study there shall be an analysis of costs of control of debris, its collection and disposal methods. Means of arresting the material prior to its reaching the Strait of Georgia should be examined, and engineered if warranted. The study should also include an examination of the utilization of the debris through special type plants, the amount of the material that can be converted and absorbed into existing or future markets. Export of the residue of this material should be encouraged if no local market exists.

The study should be financed by industry, the harbour boards, and British Columbia Forest Service.

Your Committee recommends that the study be undertaken this year so that the question can be re-examined at the next Session of the Legislature.

Several log-salvage permittees expressed concern with the extremely high number of permits issued and the competition generated by most of the occasional salvors. It is of the opinion that this competition by part-time permittees allows the escape of lower-quality logs. As an initial step to create greater efficiency in the salvage of logs and debris, your Committee recommends that the annual log-salvage permit fee be increased to \$100.

Your Committee recommends that the No Mark Visible Fund should be distributed as follows: 50 per cent to mark holders in the same ratio, for four species classes as his volume of salvaged marked logs in these categories bears to the marked logs in the categories; 50 per cent to be directed to permittees as an incentive for the removal of low-grade, small-dimension logs, and low floaters. The distribution of these funds should be based on the volume of delivery of low-quality material by each permittee. This recommendation should encourage the removal and recovery of low-quality material. Payments should be made at the time of sale of the material.

Evidence was submitted that salvors in a number of areas, especially on the east coast of Vancouver Island, have been subjected to charges by Gulf Log Salvage and brokerage fees on material that is far removed from the receiving station, and for which only a bookkeeping service is performed. It is the opinion of your Committee that certain relaxation from these charges should be considered. The Committee suggests this question be examined and a report on the matter be submitted to this Committee by the Forest Service at the next Session.

That the Select Standing Committee on Labour be authorized to investigate the labour dispute presently existing at Sandringham Private Hospital, with full power to call witnesses, examine hospital staff, financial records, employee records, trade-union officers concerned, the National Nursing Homes Limited management, personnel, and directors, and to make recommendations respecting the said dispute and the future of the said hospital to the Minister of Labour and, if need be, to the Minister of Health Services and Hospital Insurance.

His Honour was pleased in Her Majesty's name to give assent to the said Bills. The said assent was announced by E. K. DeBeck, Esquire, Clerk of the House, in the following words:

"In Her Majesty's name, His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor doth assent to these Bills."

Then Mr. Speaker addressed the Lieutenant-Governor as follows:

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR HONOUR:

We, Her Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects, the Legislative Assembly of the Province of British Columbia, in Session assembled, approach Your Honour at the close of our labours with sentiments of unfeigned devotion and loyalty to Her Majesty's person and Government and humbly beg to present for Your Honour's acceptance Bill (No. 108) intituled An Act for Granting Certain Sums of Money for the Public Service of the Province of British Columbia.

To this Bill the Clerk of the Legislative Assembly, by His Honour's command, did thereupon say:

"In Her Majesty's name, His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor doth thank Her Majesty's loyal subjects, accept their benevolence, and assent to this Bill."

Then His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor was pleased to deliver the following gracious Speech:

Mr. Speaker and Members of the Legislative Assembly:

In closing this, the Second Session of the Twenty-ninth Parliament of British Columbia, I desire to express my appreciation for the care and sincerity which have characterized your deliberations. I am grateful that legislation has been enacted which will be of benefit to the citizens of this Province.

Your deliberations in this Parliament have resulted in an unprecedented number of enactments at this Session; twenty-five (or 50 per cent) more enactments at this Session than in each of the last two Sessions, and twenty more enactments than in any Session in the last seven years. This is a substantial achievement in this our Centennial year, as each enactment represents the culmination of detailed consideration and of sound decisions made by this Assembly for the lasting benefit of the Province and all our citizens.

Financial benefits have been extended under a Special Funds Appropriation Act to enlarge the capital in the Crop Insurance Stabilization Fund and in the Home Acquisition Fund, with the result that these Funds are now soundly funded to meet the demands upon them in the coming year. Furthermore, this Act establishes a special Fund, known as the "Drug, Alcohol, and Cigarette Education, Prevention, and Rehabilitation Fund," for the purpose of education, rehabilitation, and prevention of the use of drugs, alcohol, and cigarettes.

Under the Accelerated Park Development Act a sum of fifteen million dollars (\$15,000,000) has been allocated for the purpose of park development and the creation of additional employment thereby.

The *Provincial Home Acquisition Act* has been amended to extend the grants and loans provisions on older homes until March 31, 1972.

The *Provincial Home-owner Grant Act* has provided for an increase from \$160 to \$170 per home.

In order to further benefit the home-owners in the Province, the Assessment Equalization Act has been amended to prevent an increase in assessment greater than 10 per cent in any year. In order to provide the financial resources to carry out these increased benefits and ensure the continuing economic development of the Province, taxes were imposed on cigarettes and tobacco, and on hotel and motel accommodation, and slight increases in taxes were imposed for gasoline and motive fuel.

A number of enactments were passed at this Session effecting sizeable increases in pensions and improvements in the pension schemes of civil servants, municipal

employees, teachers, college personnel, and the Members.

Great strides forward were made in the field of the administration of justice. A total of twenty-three enactments were passed, covering a wide range of subjects in this area. A number of enactments are amended to protect and safeguard the estates and interests of minors and mentally disordered persons in our society. The Consumer Protection Act was amended to give further protection to purchasers in conditional sale transactions. The Sale of Goods Act was amended to prevent the waiver of warranties and conditions. A Mortgage Brokers Act was enacted to regulate and control the mortgage business and to require full disclosure to a person borrowing money. An Air Space Titles Act was enacted, which represents a bold concept of title to air space for the future development of our cities. The Jury Act, Police Act, and Land Registry Act have been amended to deal in an effective way with new problems arising in those areas. Difficult problems in our Province arising in the field of maintentance and support of families has led to the enactment of strong new provisions in the Wives' and Children's Maintenance Act, bolstered by changes in the Attachment of Debts and Small Claims Acts. Under this legislation the Provincial Court for the first time may now deal with custody of and access to children. A new enactment also provides for the prohibition of all cigarette and tobacco advertising.

A new enactment is the *Hearing-aid Regulation Act*, which is designed to control and regulate the traffic in hearing-aids for the benefit of our citizens who require them.

In the field of agriculture a new enactment is the Synthetic Food Products Act, prohibiting those synthetic products which are designed to represent natural products. This will safeguard the health of the citizens and assist the agricultural industry. Amendments were also made to the Animals Act to deal with the problems of fierce dogs in unorganized territory.

The attention of this Assembly has been directed to and resulted in the passage of substantial amendments to the *Public Schools Act* to modernize the structure of the educational system in this Province and provide for new methodology in the field of education.

The Health Act and the Marriage Act have been amended to incorporate a number of significant changes in these Acts. The Acts of incorporation of the Vancouver General Hospital, the Royal Columbian Hospital, and the Royal Inland Hospital have been consolidated in a new Hospital Corporations Act to give uniformity in their administration.

Amendments to the *Department of Highways Act* and the *Controlled Access Highways Act* are designed to regulate the orderly development and control of lands adjoining new or relocated highways.

Great emphasis has been placed by the Assembly in its deliberations on the problems of the natural environment. Out of these deliberations this Assembly has enacted a new *Ecological Reserves Act* for the establishment of 100 ecological reserves in the Province before 1975. Similarly, a new *Environment and Land Use Act* has been enacted to protect the natural environment and control the optimum use of land for the greatest benefit of all our citizens. Likewise, the *Land Act* and the *Forest Act* have been amended and a new *Water Resources Act* has been introduced to regulate and control the use of water for all purposes.

Both the Mines Regulation Act and the Petroleum and Natural Gas Act, 1965 have been amended to provide for clarification and improvement in those Acts.

In the area of municipal affairs, a new Act provided for the assumption by the Greater Vancouver Regional District of some of the powers and functions of the Greater Vancouver Sewerage and Drainage District and the Greater Vancouver Water District. The *Municipal Act* has been amended in a number of particulars, one of which is the establishment of a land-use control system, and another is the establishment of National Building Code standards in municipalities.

The problem of snowmobiles and like vehicles has had the attention of this Assembly and resulted in the *All-terrain Vehicles Act*, which should be of great benefit to those citizens most seriously affected by the operation of such vehicles. The *Wildlife Act* has been amended to provide, among other changes, for a licence to carry firearms. The *Regional Parks Act* was also amended.

Your approval of Supply in the record sum of one billion three hundred million six hundred and ninety-two thousand six hundred dollars (\$1,300,692,600) is particularly significant in the development and growth of this Province.

These and other measures which you have carefully considered and authorized will redound to the benefit of this Province in its Centennial year and in the years to come.

Members of the Legislative Assembly, I thank you for your earnest deliberations and labours and for the supply granted for the public service. Honourable Members, I now relieve you of your legislative duties, and I trust that the blessing of Divine Providence will accompany you to your respective homes.

The Hon. W. D. Black (Provincial Secretary) then said:

Mr. Speaker and Members of the Legislative Assembly:

It is His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor's will and pleasure that the Legislative Assembly be prorogued until it shall please the Lieutenant-Governor to summon the same for dispatch of business, and this Provincial Legislative Assembly is hereby prorogued accordingly.
