THREE O'CLOCK P.M.

This being the first day of the third meeting of the Twenty-ninth Parliament or Legislative Assembly of the Province of British Columbia for the dispatch of business, pursuant to a Proclamation of Colonel the Honourable John R. Nicholson, P.C., O.B.E., Q.C., LL.D., Lieutenant-Governor of the Province, dated the 2nd day of November 1971, the members took their seats.

Prayers by the Very Rev. B. W. Whitlow.

Colonel the Honourable John R. Nicholson, P.C., O.B.E., Q.C., LL.D., Lieutenant-Governor of the Province, having entered the House, took his seat on the Throne, and was pleased to deliver the following gracious Speech:

Mr. Speaker and Members of the Legislative Assembly:

I am pleased to welcome you to the Third Session of the Twenty-ninth Parliament of this Province. I extend to you my best wishes as we now enter our second century as a Province of Canada, for it was on the 15th day of February 1872 that the First Session of the First Parliament was convened for the dispatch of business.

We have just concluded the celebrations marking the Centennial of our entry into Canadian Confederation. Over 390 local Centennial committees, representing 99 per cent of the population, were formed, thus providing a remarkable degree of participation. Throughout the entire Province hundreds of local Centennial projects for the lasting benefit of our citizens were planned and completed. The costs of these projects, amounting to nearly 12 million dollars, were shared by the Provincial, Federal, and local Governments.

During our Centennial year we were honoured by visits of many distinguished persons. The highlight of our Centennial festivities was the visit in May of Her Majesty, Queen Elizabeth II, accompanied by Their Royal Highnesses the Duke of Edinburgh and the Princess Anne. The Royal Visit was designed to be as informal as possible, and this objective was achieved in a most successful manner. Our Gracious Sovereign travelled widely throughout the Province and was everywhere acclaimed by her loyal subjects.

In honour of this occasion and recognizing Her Majesty's and my Government's interest in furthering educational opportunities for our university graduates, Her Majesty approved a scholarship, to be known as the Queen Elizabeth II British Columbia Centennial Scholarship. This scholarship, with a total value of \$5,000, is to be awarded annually to a graduate of a public university of the Province to pursue further studies in the United Kingdom.

During the year, many annual meetings and conventions of major Canadian industries and organizations were welcomed to British Columbia, as were also

visitors from other lands.

We were also honoured by visits of His Excellency, the Right Honourable Roland Michener, C.C., C.D., Governor General of Canada, and Her Excellency, Mrs. Michener, C.C., to the Kootenays in May and to the southwestern part of the Province in November.

In June the Province was the host for the Constitutional Conference from which emanated the document known as the Victoria Charter.

On July 1, the Right Honourable Pierre Trudeau and Members of the Federal Privy Council held a symbolic cabinet meeting in the Executive Council Chamber of our Parliament Buildings. At that meeting a Proclamation was approved acknowledging the centenary of the Province and wishing it well in the future. Following the Federal cabinet meeting, Prime Minister Trudeau and my Prime Minister, the Honourable W. A. C. Bennett, jointly signalled the start of the famous London to Victoria Air Race.

July 20, the actual date of the Centennial anniversary, was marked with special celebrations and activities throughout the whole Province.

The Provincial Premiers also honoured our Centennial by holding their annual conference in British Columbia in August.

On the 2nd of April 1971 I was pleased to administer the oath of office to the Honourable James Roland Chabot, who was sworn in as Minister of Labour.

In December our Province suffered a great loss in the death of the Honourable Frank Mackenzie Ross, C.M.G., M.C., an eminent soldier, industrialist, and public servant, who filled with great distinction the office of Lieutenant-Governor of British Columbia from 1955 to 1960. Earlier we were saddened by the passing of the Honourable Henry Irvine Bird, who had served as a Chief Justice of the Province of British Columbia from 1964 to 1967.

With other Canadians we mourned the death on Friday last of Frederik IX, the well-beloved King of Denmark.

Queen Margrethe II, who acceded to the throne will be remembered by the people of British Columbia as a gracious and popular visitor to our Province during the Canadian Centennial year of 1967.

In 1971 the Provincial economy moved into a more expansionary phase. Following a series of meetings between the 10 leading western nations, a new monetary agreement was reached on December 18. The long-term effects of this new accord should be beneficial if the Canadian dollar remains at or below parity with the United States dollar.

The rising value of the Canadian dollar during the year regrettably had a detrimental effect on the Province's export industries. This, coupled with the general economic climate throughout the Western World and the fiscal policies of the Federal Government, has contributed to a relatively high unemployment rate. In October 1971 there were 53,000 persons unemployed in British Columbia, or 5.7 per cent of the labour force. Nevertheless, this is a significant improvement over the 1970 figures, when 69,000 persons, or 7.9 per cent of the labour force, were unemployed.

The continued expansion of the economy in the Province is an encouraging sign, and the rate of job creation would be adequate under normal circumstances. However, I beg to report that the continued high level of migration into the Province affects this delicate balance and creates additional problems for which solutions are being sought.

In order to help reduce the unemployment rate with which we are faced you will be asked to consider job-creating measures involving the British Columbia Hydro and Power Authority, the Pacific Great Eastern Railway Company, housing, forest and park development, and protection of the ecology.

The prime thrust of my Government's policy continues to be the improvement of the environment for all citizens. An engineering study has been undertaken to establish acceptable noise-levels for motor-vehicles. A substantial number of ecological reserves have been established. British Columbia is the first Province in Canada to give ecological reserves statutory protection. The choicest recreational sites are protected from pre-emptive private uses.

The Provincial pollution control agencies have established maximum requirements for municipal effluent treatment and for solid-waste disposal.

Objectives for forest industry pollution control were established. Steps are being taken to set guidelines for mining, metallurgical, chemical, and petroleum industry pollution control.

My Government continues to provide financial assistance to accelerate pollution control and environmental quality improvement efforts.

I am pleased to report that a full-scale study has been undertaken of family relations legislation, and a Bill in that regard will be introduced for your consideration. In December last, the appointments of three new Supreme Court Justices for British Columbia were announced — the Honourable Mr. Justices Richard P. Anderson, Thomas Berger, and Harry C. McKay.

The Law Reform Commission has produced reports covering expropriation and debtor-creditor relationships, and these reports will be placed before you for consideration.

A special committee was appointed by my Government last year to study the whole question of companies and securities law. The committee has now made its first report, and legislation arising therefrom is under consideration.

My Government is also considering the feasibility of an Indian court caseworker programme, and the provision of assistance to such a programme. This is in addition to native Indian caseworkers serving with the John Howard Society on Vancouver Island and the Mainland under a programme financed by the First Citizens' Fund.

The forest resource industries of British Columbia, reversing the trend of 1970, showed an appreciable increase in lumber production in 1971.

There were 2,898 forest fires in the Province during 1971. The direct cost of fighting these fires was approximately 10.7 million dollars, the highest on record.

Despite difficult conditions in the market for pulp products, a small increase over 1970 figures is expected.

The Reforestation Programme is on schedule, with 45.5 million trees being planted in 1971.

Water resources management, in harmony with our social and economic needs, will be further assisted by the provisions of the *Water Resources Act*, a draft of which was introduced by my Government at the last Session.

I am pleased to report that the development of the hydro-electric Canal plant on the Kootenay River was commenced, utilizing the benefits of the Columbia River Treaty water-storage projects.

British Columbia's electric power generation for 1971 reached an estimated 28.8 billion kilowatt-hours. This represents a 10.2-per-cent increase over power generation in 1970.

A study will be completed this year by the British Columbia Energy Board to determine the best use of the Province's energy resources to meet power demands up to 1985. British Columbia Hydro will meet its share of these new requirements by using sources which cause the least possible adverse effect on the environment. During 1971, more than 90 per cent of the electrical energy generated by the Authority was from hydro-electric sources. It is important to note that these sources do not contribute to water or air pollution.

The Provincial Electrical Transmission Grid was extended and reinforced in 1971.

Construction of the Mica Dam project was more than 80 per cent completed by the end of 1971.

The mineral industry experienced another year of growth. This growth is expected to continue in 1972. Four new major mines, with a total ore-processing capacity of 94,000 tons per day, will be brought into production.

The proposed construction of a natural gas pipe-line to Vancouver Island is expected to spur exploratory drilling for gas in northeastern British Columbia. Total estimated reserves of raw natural gas at the end of 1970 were 9.9 trillion cubic feet, an increase of 25 per cent over 1969.

I am pleased to report that a supplement to the 1970-75 Agricultural Rehabilitation and Development Act (ARDA) agreement is expected to be signed shortly. This supplementary agreement provides for consideration to be given to rural and remote areas where more than two-thirds of those involved are of Indian ancestry.

My Government carried on its policy of pursuing a programme designed to foster the expansion of our industrial and commercial base and to encourage the growth of foreign trade. Capital investment in the Province is expected to reach 3.7 billion dollars for 1971. This is an increase of 22 per cent over the previous year.

Trade through British Columbia ports established new records. Exports were valued at 2.7 billion dollars and imports at 1.25 billion dollars.

The Fifth British Columbia Trade Fair, held in June 1971, was an outstanding success. Four hundred and twenty exhibitors from North America, Europe, and Asia were able to display their products.

My Government is pleased to report that the operating area of the Pacific Great Eastern Railway was further extended in 1971 by the addition of new trackage.

The 250-mile extension from Fort St. John to Fort Nelson was opened in September at a colourful ceremony in Fort Nelson. Marked progress was maintained on the 420-mile extension from Fort St. James to Dease Lake.

Carloadings, which have doubled in the past decade, soared to a new high, and gross revenues were up sharply.

In keeping with the expanded role of the Pacific Great Eastern Railway in the economic life of the Province, legislation will be introduced to give it a more appropriate name—the British Columbia Railway Company.

I am happy to report that the wide-ranging programme for highway construction continued. Upgrading to four-lane standards is under way on Highway 1 between Bridal Falls and Hope and on the Upper Levels section, the Lougheed Highway, and the Patricia Bay Highway. Progress has been made on two major bridge constructions—the Knight Street and the Mission Bridges. New highway construction on northern Vancouver Island commenced between Kelsey Bay and

Port McNeill and between Port Alberni and Tofino. This construction will be continued into 1972/73.

It gives me pleasure to report that an over-all increase of 14 per cent was experienced on all British Columbia Ferries routings in 1971. An astounding increase of 80 per cent was enjoyed on the northern Vancouver Island route. This was made possible by the doubling of the capacity of the *Island Princess*.

In order to meet increased traffic demands, the Queen of Vancouver and the Queen of Saanich are undergoing lengthening, and the Howe Sound Queen has been acquired.

Because of the continued concern for the safety of coastal communities exposed to tsunami, or seismic sea wave, threats, the international warning system has been streamlined. Warning messages originating in Alaska and Hawaii are now received by the Provincial Civil Defence Organization within 30 minutes and are then relayed to local communities as necessary.

In Victoria, last May, my Government sponsored a Centennial Citizens' Conference on Libraries. This conference affirmed our conviction that improved library service and intellectual growth should parallel the economic progress of British Columbia.

In the field of education, construction of new facilities continued at a good pace. In the past year, 677 classrooms and 94 gymnasia were constructed. Additional school facilities are to be constructed, involving the outlay of more than 50 million dollars.

My Government has had committees studying the accreditation process and curriculum revision. Major changes in these have been announced. Legislation will be introduced in this Session to amend the *Public Schools Act*.

My Government's emphasis on vocational and technical training is being maintained. The first open-pit mining school in Canada was opened in August in Rossland. This school was made possible with co-operation from the Mining Association of British Columbia and the Provincial and Federal Governments.

I am pleased to report that our college system is developing at a remarkable rate and with most successful results. In the past few years enrolment has increased from 2,500 to 14,000 students.

The Select Standing Committee on Social Welfare and Education will be asked to review the tenure of members of the faculties in the public universities.

In keeping with my Government's policies to ease unemployment, I am gratified to inform you that a greatly expanded programme of new Government building construction and building maintenance has been adopted. New buildings are under construction at Creston, Prince George, Smithers, and Nelson. Plans are proceeding for new buildings at Burns Lake, Dawson Creek, Fort St. John, Kamloops, Powell River, Trail, Victoria, and the British Columbia Building in Vancouver.

The Gas Act, the Electrical Energy Act, and the Boiler and Pressure Vessel Act have been examined. My Government will introduce legislation to provide for the consolidation of these Acts into a Safety Engineering Services Act.

I am indeed pleased to report that the improvements in the pension plans for Civil Service employees introduced by my Government last year have provided improved benefits for those retiring in the future. More than 8,400 retired employees and their widows received increases amounting to more than 2 million dollars a year.

It also gives me pleasure to announce that arrangements have been made with the Federal Government whereby Provincial civil servants, teachers, and others will benefit under the new unemployment insurance regulations. The rapid growth of population in our Province has been more than matched by an increasing labour force. The population growth of approximately 3 per cent is the highest in Canada, while the labour population growth is more than 6 per cent.

In October 1971 the number of gainfully employed reached 877,000, a gain

of 73,000 over the previous year.

I am gratified to report that British Columbia enjoyed a relatively good year in the field of labour relations. The absence of prolonged labour disputes suggests that the combined efforts of labour, management, and my Government avoided serious confrontation.

You will be asked to consider amendments to labour legislation during the Session.

The Workmen's Compensation Board has concluded hearings for revised accident-prevention regulations. New regulations will reflect the co-operative effort of labour, management, and Government officials, who have drafted 255 new regulations and 520 revisions. These changes were made necessary by the many changes in industrial technology. My Government congratulates labour and management for their spirit of co-operation.

The continuing policy of my Government to emphasize environmental excellence throughout the Province is manifested through joint financing for municipal water, sewer, and pollution control and abatement.

The financial position of British Columbia's municipalities is unexcelled any-

where in Canada.

I am pleased to report that the *Litter Act* of 1970, which was the first in Canada, has materially reduced some facets of the litter problem. You will be asked to consider amendments to this Act to clarify further this legislation.

The Regional Park Act is receiving ever-wider utilization by the regional

districts, and certain desirable amendments will be placed before you.

As a result of continued and expanding promotional effort, I am pleased to report that we have again enjoyed a substantial growth in the visitor industry.

The *Hearing-aid Regulation Act*, the first of its kind in Canada, was proclaimed on July 1, 1971. A Board has been appointed to administer the Act, and regulations have been promulgated.

The dynamic programme undertaken by my Government to provide for increased medical services and hospital care to our citizens continues. Thirteen major hospital construction projects, totalling 772 beds, were completed in 1971. At year-end there were an additional 25 projects under construction designed to provide 1,799 beds.

The problem of alcohol and narcotic addiction is of great concern to my Government. I am pleased to commend the excellent work being done by the Alcohol Foundation of British Columbia and the Narcotic Foundation of British Columbia and by other organizations. From funds provided in the Drug, Alcohol, and Cigarette Prevention and Rehabilitation Fund, established last year, the Advisory Committee has made progress in developing programmes. In particular, I note that to combat the disturbing narcotic-addiction problem, my Government has authorized an extension of hospital insurance coverage to the Withdrawal Treatment Programme of the Narcotic Addiction Foundation.

As a result of a survey, new beach-water quality standards have been set.

A major expansion of mental health centre services took place during 1971 with the development of seven community centres throughout the Province. This expansion was part of my Government's concern and continuing programme of developing mental health services and programmes on a regional basis.

A pilot study of psychiatric home treatment, as an alternative to admission to a mental health hospital, was commenced in July 1971. My Government is providing \$90,000 for the operational costs of this study, which is being carried out in conjunction with the Federal Government.

In June last, my Government inaugurated its programme of outright grants-in-aid to regional districts, municipalities, and nonprofit organizations for the construction of special-care homes, to satisfy a long-felt need for boarding-house accommodation at reasonable cost for those of our citizens requiring a limited degree of medical and nursing supervision in their daily lives.

My Government is directly sponsoring the construction of four special-care homes of yet another type. One is already under construction in Victoria. Two will be constructed in Greater Vancouver and the fourth will be constructed in the Interior of the Province.

A high degree of interest was evident in my Government's programme of grants-in-aid of elderly citizens' housing, and it gives me great pleasure to report that accommodations in this type of housing, sponsored by nonprofit societies, had passed the accumulative 10,000 mark in mid-year of 1971.

Public interest in Barkerville and Fort Steele Historic Parks was maintained at a very high level in the 1971 season. In addition, the acquisition of important historical areas in Fort St. James was also continued, with a view to developments taking place at this important site during the coming fiscal year. It is also to be noted that the new facilities provided for the Provincial Archives and the Provincial Museum continue to be extensively used by the people of British Columbia and by visitors to this Province.

My Government is gratified to report the institution of social and economic rehabilitation programmes to reduce the numbers requiring social assistance. New programmes, or those which have been greatly expanded to cater to this situation, include public work activity projects, training and upgrading for employment, on-the-job training, and the Special Opportunities Programme for Working Mothers.

My Government also recognizes the need for greater assistance to the permanently handicapped and, accordingly, Social Allowances to this group were increased.

A Job Opportunities Programme in which my Government has agreed to pay one-half the wage costs between November 1971 and April 30, 1972, for those in receipt of social assistance for at least three months has provided both opportunity and incentive for many seeking employment.

We have much to be thankful for in British Columbia, and we look forward to the coming year with renewed vigour and a sense of challenge.

The Public Accounts and reports of the departments of my Government will be presented to you, and estimates for the ensuing year will be submitted.

To these and all other matters which may come before you I ask your most careful attention and I pray that Divine Providence may guide your deliberations. Mr. Speaker and Honourable Members, I leave you now to the discharge of your legislative duties.

His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor was then pleased to retire.

The Speaker reported that, to prevent mistakes, he had obtained a copy of His Honour's Speech.

On the motion of the Hon. L. R. Peterson, Bill (No. 1) intituled An Act to Amend the Evidence Act was introduced, read a first time, and Ordered to be placed on the Orders of the Day for second reading at the next sitting after today.

On the motion of the Hon. W. A. C. Bennett, seconded by the Hon. L. R. Peterson, it was Ordered—

That the appointment of Alan Myles Hutchinson as Sergeant-at-Arms in place of Denzil Greensted Ashby, made by His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor by and with the advice of his Executive Council on the 2nd day of December 1971, be now ratified pursuant to the provisions of section 44 of the Constitution Act, being chapter 71 of the Revised Statutes of British Columbia, 1960.

On the motion of the Hon. W. A. C. Bennett, seconded by the Hon. W. D. Black, it was Ordered—

That the Speech of His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor be taken into consideration at the next sitting of the House, and that this Order have precedence over all other business, except introduction of Bills, until disposed of.

Moved by the Hon. W. D. Black, seconded by the Hon. L. R. Peterson-

That the Votes and Proceedings of this House be printed, being first perused by Mr. Speaker, and that he do appoint the printing thereof, and that no person but such as he shall appoint do presume to print the same.

Mr. Barrett moved in amendment, seconded by Mrs. Dailly-

That the motion be amended by adding the following words: "That the 1971 Record of Debates be withdrawn for correction; that such correction be done with the advice of an all party committee appointed by the Speaker and which committee shall also assist the Speaker in the recording and printing of this Session's debates both in the House and in committee stages of Estimates and Bills."

Mr. Speaker ruled the motion out of order on the ground that it purported to amend Part IV of the Standing Orders and, accordingly, was a substantive motion requiring notice.

An appeal was taken from the ruling of the Chair.

Mr. Speaker, quoting May, 17th edition at page 795, ruled that while the sub-amendment would involve expenditure of public money, it nevertheless was framed in sufficiently abstract terms that, if agreed to, the subamendment would have no operative effect involving public expenditure and therefore, in his opinion, did not offend the provisions of Standing Order 66.

- 89 Mr. Hartley asked the Hon. the Provincial Secretary the following questions:
 With reference to privately owned "approved laboratories" under the Medical Services Act Regulations—
 - 1. Have any private laboratories been approved?
- 2. If the answer to No. 1 is yes, (a) how many have been approved, (b) in each one approved what are the names of the owner or owners, shareholders, and financial beneficiaries of all categories, and (c) in the case of each laboratory what are the total amounts paid since the date of its approval by the Overall Medical Services Plan?
- 3. Have any doctors been given authority to refer to laboratories in which they have a direct or indirect interest?
- 4. If the answer to No. 3 is yes, what is the name of the doctor and the name of the laboratory in each case?

- "1. Yes, but on an interim restricted temporary basis only; the Medical Services Commission has issued to date only interim temporary approvals while investigation, analyses of quality, collation of accurate data and reviews continue. In order to control and designate the type or types of procedures to be approved as insured services when performed at a facility, the Commission considered first three broad classifications as pathology, electrodiagnosis, and radiology and, second, under pathology, established five subcategories, as Category 3—full range of tests; Category 2A—a restricted range of hæmatology tests; Category 2B—a restricted range of microbiology tests; Category 2c—a restricted range of clinical chemistry tests; and Category 1, which included only the 11 specified tests that all physicians may perform for their patients as insured services under the regulations.
- "2. (a) No private laboratory has been issued an interim certificate approving the full range of diagnostic laboratory services covered under the regulations. Examples: Echoencephalograms have been approved for major hospital facilities only, but five private facilities of practising neurologists have been issued temporary certificates for electroencephalograms; 15 private pathology laboratories (some operating from more than one address) have been issued interim temporary approval at the full Category 3 pathology level; 25 private facilities operated by radiologists have been issued temporary approval for radiology only; some 57 clinics, group practices, and partnerships have been issued interim certificates in various restricted categories in pathology Category 2 and Category 1 and a few of these have been temporarily approved also for radiology services; six group practices or partnerships have been issued temporary certificates for radiology only; a number of other temporary certificates have been issued for restricted ranges of tests for single practitioners operating laboratories particularly in the more isolated areas of the Province.
- "(b) Complete information and full accurate data are still being collated and an accurate answer is not available at this time.
- "(c) Information not available as interim certificates were effective November 15, 1971, and few claims for services rendered from that date have yet been processed for payment.
- "3. In the practice of medicine, practically all physicians perform some diagnostic laboratory procedures from which they derive a direct or indirect financial benefit and particularly in group practice or clinic practice there are laboratory facilities of varying types; control is effected within quality standards by the restricted range of tests approved as stipulated in the temporary approvals. Of the 15 private pathology laboratories to which interim approval at Category 3 level has been issued, during the interim period of approval, referrals from physicians with

a financial interest are acceptable in three cases only—Northmount Medical Laboratory Services, North Vancouver, with referrals acceptable from Dr. W. Boldt, Internist and Specialist in Hæmatology; Clinical Laboratory Services (Inland Medical Laboratory Ltd.), Chilliwack, which shareholders include nearly all actively practising physicians in Chilliwack; and Vancouver Island Laboratories Ltd., in Nanaimo, with referrals acceptable from Drs. B. A. Horner and H. C. Welch, Internists. In electrodiagnosis only major hospitals have been approved for echoencephalograms; there are five private facilities of neurologists that received temporary approval for electroencephalograms and the practitioners, of course, have a financial interest in the work they perform. In radiology, 25 X-ray laboratories operated by radiologists have been issued temporary certificates of approval for radiology only and received referrals from other physicians with no interest in the facility. In others, as clinics or group practices, some with X-ray facilities (examples are Burris Clinic, Kamloops; Knox Clinic, Kelowna; Underhill Clinic, Kelowna; etc.), the practising physician partners have a direct or indirect financial interest. Until studies are complete an accurate and full answer is not available as yet.

- 2. How many of these students in each case were (a) residents of the participating school district, (b) residents of British Columbia, other than residents of the participating school district, (c) residents of other Canadian provinces, and (d) residents of countries other than Canada?
- 3. With respect to No. 2, what percentage of the individual regional college's enrolment are the answers to (a), (b), (c), and (d)?

The Hon. D. L. Brothers replied as follows:

"For 1971/72 Table A below shows the data requested in Nos. 1, 2 (c), 2 (d), and 3. Data requested for Nos. 2 (a) and 2 (b) are not available for all students registered. However the data requested is Nos. 2 (a) and 2 (b) for full-time students registered for the first time in a college are shown in Table B.

- 138 Mr. McGeer asked the Hon. the Minister of Lands, Forests, and Water Resources the following questions:
- 1. Were Lots 13 to 18, Block 3, Plan 818, Stewart Townsite, leased to P. J. Curran?
 - 2. If the answer to No. 1 is yes, what were the terms of the lease?
 - 3. Have the terms of said lease been fulfilled?
 - 4. What is the present status of the lots?

The Hon. R. G. Williston replied as follows:

- "1. Yes.
- "2. The lease was issued on August 19, 1970, for a period of one year for warehouse purposes. The lease contained an option to purchase which could only be exercised when the land had been fully developed as a warehouse site.
 - "3. No.
- "4. The lease expired on August 19, 1971. The lessee subsequently applied to purchase the property; however, inspection revealed that the improvements did not constitute bona fide development. The application to purchase was disallowed on February 2, 1972, and the lessee has been given 60 days from that date to remove his improvements and clean up the land. The land is now considered to be vacant Crown land."

- "5. Presence of trailer was noted during an inspection on October 19, 1971. No action is contemplated by my Department at this time due to the fact that Mr.

Curran is involved in a Court case with the Village of Stewart which is still pending before the District Magistrate. No disposition of the land will be made until the Court case is concluded."

With reference to day-care centres for children-

- 1. Are any day-care centres receiving financial subsidies from the Government?
- 2. If the answer to No. 1 is yes, (a) how many centres are there, (b) what is the formula of the subsidy paid, and (c) what was the total amount of subsidy paid to each relevant centre during 1971?

The Hon. P. A. Gaglardi replied as follows:

- "1. Yes.
- "2. (a) 125, (b) Group Day Care: The following payments are made for each day the child attends. When the child has attended fifteen days or more in the months, payment will be made for every day the centre was operating that month. (The number of days attended should be shown correctly, but the maximum amount payable entered for the child.)
- "PLAN B: Families whose assets and income, reviewed by one of the designated agencies using the Homemaker Financial Eligibility Test, shows that they have only \$11 to \$25 residual monthly to pay for the full-day care required (i.e., \$22 to \$50 if two children must attend) qualify for this plan. A payment of \$2.40 per day per child from a qualified family may be authorized for attendance at *any* licensed daycare centre. Authorization will be forwarded to the centre on the attached Form A and families should renew it every six months.
- "PLAN C: Families whose assets and income, reviewed by one of the designated agencies using the Homemaker Financial Eligibility Test, shows that they have \$10 or less residual monthly to pay for full-day care of a child (i.e., \$20 if two children must attend, children-in-care, or children of families who are in receipt of Social Allowance qualify for a payment under this plan. The payment per day per child from a qualified family shall be \$3.40 per day for attendance at any licensed day-care centre. Authorization will be forwarded to the centre on the attached Form A and families should renew it every six months. When this payment does not equal the full fee charged paying parents at the centre and the costs per child of the centre, the operator may apply through the administering office, to the Superintendent of Child Welfare for review of their finances and possible upward revision of the rate.
- "PLAN A: Centres managed by nonprofit groups which accept the conditions below qualify for a payment of \$1 per day per child for children not qualified for

Plan B or C. The centres are required to meet the following conditions in addition to being licensed:

- "1. At least 10 per cent of their enrolment in any month must qualify for the Plan C payment.
- "2. Must have submitted their proposed budget for the coming fiscal year on the attached Form B.
- "3. Must submit their audited financial statement for the past fiscal year to the Superintendent of Child Welfare through the administering agency as soon as possible after the end of their fiscal year.
- "4. Must charge a sliding fee to all parents except those qualifying for Plan C. The maximum fee charged shall not be less than the *per diem* cost of the preceding year determined from their financial statement, or the projected cost for the coming year as shown by their budget.
- "5. Agree to inform the Superintendent of Child Welfare at least one full month beforehand of any decision to terminate the operation. Such notification to include a full report on the current financial situation as well as an explanation of any unusual community conditions causing their decision.

"Children Receiving After School Care Only: Where a licensed pre-school centre or a licensed or approved home provides care after school hours, payment for children shall be: Plan C, not more than \$1.25 per half day; or Plan B, not more than \$0.75 per half day.

"During school holidays when full day care is provided, the rate will increase to either: (a) The regular Plan B or C per diem rate at a licensed family day-care home; or (b) at a licensed centre, the full day rate shall be: Plan C, up to \$3 per day; or Plan B, up to \$2 per day.

- 3. Is the White River valley to be logged and, if so, when will the logging commence?

The Hon. R. G. Williston replied as follows:

- "1. Yes, this decision was made in 1914 when the pulp lease was issued in the White River. The pulp lease was subsequently included in Tree-farm Licence 39.
- "2. Partly, the strip will not be continuous and the width will vary depending on the logging plan.
- "3. Logging commenced in the Upper White in 1967, and will continue in accord with an approved logging plan which makes provision for use of, and protection to, the other resources, including fish, wildlife, and recreation."
- **162** Mr. Lorimer asked the Hon. the Minister of Recreation and Conservation the following questions:
- 1. Did the Provincial Government purchase land for the purpose of establishing the West Coast Park?
- 2. If the answer to No. 1 is yes, who were the vendors and what was the price per acre paid in each case?

The Hon. W. K. Kiernan replied as follows:

- "1. Yes.
- "2. One hundred and nine vendors have concluded agreements with the Government on their properties for a total purchase price of \$3,498,060 to December 31, 1971. Prices per acre vary as to location, nature of the land, and improvements where applicable. No average price per acre can be realistically stated at this time and each purchase is the subject of individual appraisal by a qualified appraiser."

After the first 30 years, the Province has the option under the Treaty of accepting each year thereafter, for a further minimum period of 30 years and continuously thereafter unless either party terminates the agreement, which would be most unlikely, either 50 per cent of downstream power benefits or cash therefor. Inflation will increase these values and greatly benefit the Province at that time so that it receives many times the amounts originally estimated.
 - "3. No.
 - "4. British Columbia Hydro and Power Authority cash flow.
 - "5. Not finalized.
 - "6. Not finalized."

Honourable Members—At the opening of the House today the Honourable Leader of the Opposition rose on a matter described as a breach of privilege, namely, the placing of an advertisement by the Government in certain newspapers for the purpose of influencing debate on a Bill presently before the House, and moved that a committee on privileges be appointed to consider the matter complained of.

The Chair reserved its decision on whether or not a prima facie case of breach of privilege had been established. I have had an opportunity of examining the advertisement in question and of considering the said motion. I have also given consideration to the arguments advanced by different members and the various authorities referred to by them.

The general subject of the "privileges" of Parliament and its members was fully considered by the Chair in a decision recorded in the Journals of the Legislature, 1968, at page 134. I would refer the honourable members to that decision and particularly to page 135, which reads as follows:

"The 17th edition of May, at page 42, describes 'Parliamentary privilege' as 'the sum of the peculiar rights enjoyed by each House collectively as a constituent

part of the high court of Parliament and by the members of each House individually, without which they could not discharge their functions . . . The privileges of Parliament are rights which are absolutely necessary for the due execution of its powers. They are enjoyed by individual members because the House cannot perform its functions without unimpeded use of the services of its members; and by each House for the protection of its members and the vindication of its own authority and dignity. When any of these immunities, both of the members individually and of the assembly in its collective capacity, which are known by the general name of 'privileges,' are disregarded or attacked by any individual or authority, the offence is called 'a breach of privileges' and is punishable under the law of Parliament."

In the same edition of May the privileges which attach to members of Parliament individually are enumerated as follows: (1) Privilege of freedom of speech; (2) privilege of freedom from arrest or molestation; (3) privilege of access to the Crown.

In Bourinot's "Parliamentary Procedure," 4th edition, at page 303, "questions of privilege" are described in general terms as referring to all matters affecting the rights and immunities of the House collectively, or to the position and conduct of members in their representative character.

The power of this House to define those privileges is sanctioned by the *Constitution Act*, R.S.B.C., 1960, chapter 71, and such privileges have been largely codified in the *Legislative Assembly Privileges Act*, R.S.B.C., 1960, chapter 215.

As explained by Dawson in the 2nd edition of "Government of Canada" at page 399, the privileges of the individual member are primarily designed to enable the member to attend his Parliamentary duties without interference and to encourage members to speak and act freely without fear of undesirable consequences.

I have also examined the Journals and other authorities for any instance in which it has been held that the matter complained of constitutes a breach of privilege and have found no relevant precedent. It is stated in the 16th edition of May, page 47, that while "either House may expound the law of Parliament and vindicate its own privileges, it is agreed that no new privilege can be created."

The motion of the Honourable the Leader of the Opposition also raises a question of whether or not a "contempt of Parliament" has occurred. I find in the 16th edition of May, at page 43, that "contempt of Parliament" as distinguished from "breach of the privileges of Parliament" relates to offences against the authority or dignity of Parliament, such as disobedience to its legitimate commands or libels upon itself, its officers or its members. Such actions, though often called "breaches of privilege" are more properly distinguished as "contempts."

As the matter raised by the Honourable Leader of the Opposition does not fall within the scope of any previously expounded privilege of Parliament or its members, and clearly does not fall within the above definition of "contempt," I must rule that neither a prima facie breach of privilege nor a contempt has occurred.

- 1. Did any general hospital under British Columbia Hospital Insurance Service operate psychiatric wards for children during the year ended December 31, 1971?
- 2. If the answer to No. 1 is yes, where are such units located, how many beds involved, and how many children treated during the year indicated in No. 1?
- 3. Are any such units referred to in No. 1 at present (a) under construction and (b) approved in principle?

- 5. Has any request for such facilities been renewed from the Health Sciences Centre, University of British Columbia?
- 6. If answer to No. 5 is affirmative, at what stage of development is such project?

The Hon. R. R. Loffmark replied as follows:

- "2. Vancouver General Hospital, eight beds, 259 admissions involving 127 children. Hospitals operating psychiatric wards report that admissions and bed allocations are determined by the hospital medical staff, the attending physician, and the administration according to the diagnosis and state of urgency indicated by the admitting doctor at the time of admission, but without regard to age or sex of the patient. In many hospitals beds are not specifically designated for any particular disorder or for patients coming within a specified age group. In some cases patients under 16 years of age requiring psychiatric treatment are admitted to a pediatric ward.
- "3. (a) No and (b) no. There has been a delay in getting into operation a new 20-bed unit at the Eric Martin Institute, Royal Jubilee Hospital, Victoria. However, arrangements have now been completed to allow the programme to get underway.
 - "4. See No. 3.
- "5. There has been a request from the British Columbia Centennial Child and Family Psychiatric Centre Committee for a centre which would be located at the University of British Columbia. It is understood that the application has the support of the Board of Governors of the University of British Columbia on the understanding that the project would not involve commitment of university funds?
- "6. The project has been reviewed by the Department as part of the proposed Health Sciences Centre complex and would have to be achieved within the total funds and beds allocated to the Health Sciences Centre complex. It is understood that, alternatively, the university has included such a project in their five-year-plan under Health Resources funds."
- **128** Mr. *Nimsick* asked the Hon. the Minister of Lands, Forests, and Water Resources the following questions:
- 1. Did the Department of Lands, Forests, and Water Resources pay the cost of the drainage of Taylor Slough in the vicinity of Kimberley?

- 1. Is the Government prepared to furnish full-time, legally qualified Provincial Judges parity in pay and pension, on the County Court scale, with the Federal Judges?
 - 2. If the answer to No. 1 is yes, when?

The Hon. L. R. Peterson replied as follows:

"1 and 2. County Court Judges' salaries are fixed by the Federal *Judges Act* without annual or regular increases. The full-time Provincial Court Judges have been receiving annual increases and I would hope that such increases might continue."

Objectives

TOWARD A DEFINITION

There appeared to be substantial agreement among those representing the official point of view of the three public universities that the granting of "tenure" to a faculty member is the provision in the employment contract between the univer-

sity and the faculty member of a term that the duration of the contract is for an indefinite period or in other words an "appointment without term." There was also common understanding among the three groups that a faculty member may terminate a tenured appointment by resignation, repudiation, or retirement.

There seemed less certainty about the power of the university to terminate such an appointment. Most representatives agreed that there are "ways" that a university can find to end the tenure of unsatisfactory faculty members but, with the exception of "dismissal for cause," these are not explicitly stated in the faculty handbooks.

ADVANTAGES AND DISADVANTAGES OF THE TENURE SYSTEM

In defence of the tenure system, three basic arguments are made: It protects freedom in teaching and research; it provides security of employment; and it is a means of recognizing long and valued service.

In addition, the university representatives pointed out that the lengthy and involved selection procedures used in granting tenure gave some protection to the university from unproductive and unsatisfactory faculty members. They also agreed that the selection procedures were a major source of the controversy surrounding the tenure system and each informed the Committee that these procedures were under review.

Finally, the university representatives advised the Committee that, in order to remain competitive in attracting good teachers and scholars, no single university could afford to abandon the tenure system.

Those who oppose tenure generally do so on the grounds that, once gained, there is often a slacking-off of effort on the part of the faculty member, resulting in an increase of "dead wood" in departments. Moreover, they point out that the granting of tenure is not reciprocal, since a tenured person is free to move and is not committed in any way to the university which gave him tenure.

Most witnesses appearing before the Committee to present opposing points of view did not appear to oppose tenure per se. They opposed the method by which tenure is granted. Representatives of students, for example, felt that a more formal structure should be established to ensure that the student point of view is heard. The representatives of the Women's Action Group felt that women were discriminated against in the ratio of tenured appointments between men and women. One individual protested the fact that universities did not in their tenure documents specify the means of discontinuing a tenure appointment.

UNIVERSITY AUTONOMY AND ACADEMIC FREEDOM

In making the following observations, which university authorities may wish to consider, the Committee wishes to reaffirm its belief in the principles of university autonomy and academic freedom and to state its understanding of them. The Committee believes that institutions of higher education are conducted for the common good, which depends upon the free search for, and the exposition of, truth and understanding. Academic freedom is indispensable to a democratic society. The academic community must be free to participate in the democratic process of government as citizens, to learn and to teach what scholarship suggests is the truth, to question what is believed to have been the truth, and to publish without fear of reprisal what scholarship has discovered.

The Committee takes the position that academic freedom and responsibility are inseparable and must be considered simultaneously. They are shared by members of the academic community, including students. Tenure, on the other hand, is a

specific provision of employment accorded to those members of the university who

qualify for it.

In setting forth the following observations, the Committee is in no way purporting to abrogate the principles it believes in. In no way would it attempt to impose these recommendations on any university. But having listened objectively to a number of different points of view, and after studying a number of pertinent documents, the Committee feels that it might be able to be helpful. It is in this spirit that it makes the following observations:

(a) That the practice followed by universities in granting "appointments with-

out term" be continued;

(b) That the three public universities of the Province work together to agree on a common definition of "appointment without term";

(c) That there be no discrimination, in terms of race, religion, sex, or politics.

On February 28, 1972, on the motion of the Hon. L. R. Peterson, it was Ordered that Bill (No. 30) intituled Family Relations Act be referred to the Select Standing Committee on Social Welfare and Education.

Since that date your Committee has received and heard submissions by many individuals and by such organizations as the Family Law Subsection of the Canadian Bar Association, the Status of Women Council, the British Columbia Association of Social Workers, and the Prosecutor for the City of Vancouver. Your Committee also consulted with solicitors from the Department of the Attorney-General.

Your Committee recommends that Bill (No. 30) the Family Relations Act

proceed with the following amendments:

Subsection (1) of section 5 should be struck out and the following substituted:

"(1) Where a spouse applies for alimony, maintenance, or judicial separation, the judge may, in his discretion, having regard to the conduct of the spouses, refuse to grant all or part of the order applied for."

The word "illegitimate" should be deleted in the first line of paragraph (iii)

of clause (a) of section 15.

The words "and in addition may" should be inserted in the body of subsection (1) of section 25 between clauses (b) and (c).

The words "or, where special circumstances warrant, to such other person or persons as the interests of the child require;" should be added at the end of clause (d) of subsection (1) of section 25.

The following should be added as subsection (4) of section 25:

"(4) No person shall unlawfully interfere with the custody of, or access to, a child awarded to a person under subsection (1)."

The words "that may be subsequently varied to meet changed circumstances," should be inserted after the word "order," in the second line of subsection (3) of section 35.

The following should be added as subsection (9) of section 52:

"(9) For the purposes of this part, a maintenance order or a complaint made under reciprocal enforcement of support legislation may be treated as a maintenance order made provisionally where the respondent was neither served within the reciprocating state nor present or represented at a hearing therein."

Your Committee also recommends that the Law Clerk, pursuant to Standing Order 94, delete the marginal notes opposite clauses (i), (ii), (iii), (iv), and (v) of clause (a) of section 15, and that he change the marginal note opposite section 59 to read "Where order made in language other than English".

MR. SPEAKER:

Your Special Committee on the Classification of Motion-picture Films begs leave to report as follows:

Pursuant to motion of February 8, 1972, your Special Committee on the Classification of Motion-picture Films was ordered convened to study the following matter:

Resolved, That a Special Committee be appointed to review the policy governing the classification of motion-picture films prior to their display within the Province and to make recommendations to the House for any revision thereof deemed to be in the public interest.

The organizational meeting was held on Tuesday, February 15, 1972. Mr. Burt Campbell, M.L.A., was elected as chairman and the Hon. Isabel P. Dawson, Minister without Portfolio, as secretary.

The Committee held eight meetings and the following individuals and groups appeared before it with submissions:

Mr. Ray McDonald, Director of Film Classification.

B.C. Projectionists Local 348, IATSE and MPMO of the United States and Canada.

Motion Picture Theatre Association of British Columbia.

Vancouver Film Board.

Mr. Les Wedman, film critic, Vancouver Sun.

B.C. Civil Liberties Association.

Pacific Federation of Film Societies.

Miss A. Joan Reynertson, Associate Professor and Director of Film Studies, Department of Theatre, University of British Columbia.

Mr. Peter McNelly, film critic, Victoria Times.

Vancouver and District Council of Churches.

Roman Catholic Archdiocese of Vancouver.

Mr. James Spears, former film critic, Vancouver Province.

Submissions from the public were also considered by Committee members.

The Committee viewed two movies at meetings, A Clockwork Orange and The Stewardesses, while individual Committee members took numerous opportunities to see other films as well.

The Committee is grateful to the Director of Film Classification, Mr. McDonald, who attended all meetings and provided a great deal of valuable information to the Committee. The kindness of Warner Bros. Distributing (Canada) Ltd. and Astral Films Ltd. in providing films, and of Famous Players Ltd, in providing screening facilities, is appreciated and acknowledged.

It is the opinion of the Committee that the *Motion Pictures Act* of 1970 is working well. That the way the Act is being administered and the manner in which the classification system works are quite successful is attested to by the fact that other provinces are adopting procedures initiated here. British Columbia's "warning" system, for example, is being followed in varying degree by most of the other provincial film classifiers. They find the warnings protect both majority and minority groups.

With regard to the three classification categories:

1. "General, being suitable for all persons."

This category should contain nothing that might offend any normal individual or group. The Committee recommends that the advertising of all films which the Director has classified as "General" should convey prominently the words "General Entertainment" in all advertising. It is also recommended that the words "Parental Guidance Recommended" be affixed by the Director whenever he believes it necessary, along with appropriate caption.

2. "Adult, being unsuitable for, or of no interest to, persons under the age of 18 years."

This classification advises parents that the Director considers such pictures unsuitable for children. There is no age-limit on attendance, and none is proposed, since it is felt that parents should know best the emotional limits and the understanding capacity of their own children. The Committee recommends that this category be renamed "Mature Entertainment," being unsuitable for, or of no interest to, persons under the age of 18 years; that the advertising of all films which the Director classifies as "Mature Entertainment" should convey prominently the words "Mature Entertainment," and that appropriate warning captions be inserted in advertising by the Director.

3. "Restricted, being suitable only for persons of the age of 18 years or over. Unless authorized by the Director, or unless the person is accompanied by his parent or other responsible adult person, no person under the age of 18 years shall attend or be permitted to attend a motion-picture theatre at which a film classified as 'restricted' is exhibited or displayed."

It is this classification which is so greatly misunderstood because of the words "Restricted—No Admittance to Persons under 18" inserted in all advertising by the Director. In actual fact, persons under that age may attend if accompanied by a parent or other responsible adult. The Committee recommends that a consent form be required by the Director.

The Committee emphasizes that the restricted category must be guarded constantly and maintained with the utmost zeal. It must never be allowed to become a receptacle for filmed trash.

The Committee considered a fourth, or "X Category," but rejected it.

The Committee is of the considered opinion that it is lack of detailed knowledge about the classification system and what it sets out to do that is a cause of concern amongst many people. Not a few of them believe, for example, that

warning comments are used by theatres to promote a movie. While this might be the case in some instances, warning captions are in fact required by the Director of Film Classification so that movie-goers are forewarned as to what to expect.

The Committee further recommends that all available methods be employed to better inform the public about film classification and how it works. Pamphlets are presently available in some theatres advising patrons how to obtain a more detailed brochure explaining film classification. These pamphlets should be available in all motion-picture theatres. As well, consideration should be given to periodically advertising the availability of the brochure on the theatre page of newspapers, and to making advertising trailers available to theatres informing their patrons as to how they might obtain further information on film classification.

The Committee also recommends that the staff of the classification Director's office be increased to provide a larger number of experienced people in this field in the interests of future continuity.

REPORT No. 1

LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE ROOM, March 28, 1972

MR. SPEAKER:

Your Select Standing Committee on Municipal Matters begs leave to report as follows:

By motion of February 7, 1972, your Committee was authorized as follows:

"That this House authorize the Select Standing Committee on Municipal Matters to examine the criteria and conditions which should be met either to incor-

porate by statute an area as a municipality or to include an area in an existing municipality and to report their findings and recommendations to the House."

The Committee held five meetings. The principal representations made to the Committee were presented by the Union of British Columbia Municipalities, firstly, in a brief submitted March 6 and in a supplementary brief which was requested by the Committee, which was presented March 20. Alderman E. J. Broome, President of the UBCM; Mayor S. A. Fleming; and Director M. H. Holmes, accompanied by Mr. C. S. J. McKelvie, Executive Director, presented the briefs on behalf of the Union, and the Committee wishes to express its appreciation to the Union for the clear, straight forward presentation and frank discussions. In addition to the presentations by the Committee, staff members of the Department of Municipal Affairs were present at most of the Committee meetings.

The Union of British Columbia Municipalities' submission was basically as follows:

Firstly, they recommended that criteria be established by legislation for both the incorporation of disseparate municipalities and for the extension of boundaries of existing municipalities.

Secondly, they recommended that the Minister be empowered to appoint a secretary whose function would be:

- (1) To determine all instances where in his opinion the relevant criteria have been met and to report his findings to the Minister.
- (2) To proceed after authorization by the Minister to assemble all relevant data.
- (3) To publicize that an inquiry will be held in connection with the proposed incorporation or boundary extension.
- (4) To convene the inquiry and perform such duties as members of the Inquiry Board may require and to advise the Board on all matters on which they are required to make a decision.

Thirdly, the Union of British Columbia Municipalities proposed that in each case an Inquiry Board be established. The Minister would have discretion to determine the number of members of the Inquiry Board, the suggestion being that in minor cases of boundary extension a single person would be sufficient, but where the Minister is of the opinion that the issue is such that it requires a Board of more than a single member, the membership should be selected as follows:

One member selected by electoral area directors of the regional district;

One member of the Council of the host municipality (where extension of boundaries is in question); and

The two members selected would nominate a third member who would be Chairman from a list maintained by the Minister of individuals such as past presidents of the Union of British Columbia Municipalities or other prominant and respected municipal officials;

Where more than one host municipality or community is involved the Minister would specify additional Board members.

The Inquiry Board thus established shall:

- (1) Meet forthwith in the area under consideration.
- (2) Determine the boundaries, with subsequent review and revision as required.
- (3) Establish whether the criteria have been met within the boundaries so determined.
- (4) If the criteria have been met, hold public hearings and receive submissions to evaluate the opinions of all parties concerned.

The Inquiry Board would report to the Minister, who would be empowered to provide that the question of incorporation or extension of boundaries be submitted to the owner-electors and property-owners in the community and that a 60 per cent plurality would be required to carry such a vote. In the case of a boundary extension the vote would be on the basis of the extension area and the existing municipality combined.

The Union of British Columbia Municipalities also recommended that subsection (5) of section 12 be made applicable to all classes of municipalities so that in the event of an extension of boundary provisions could be made that the newly included areas would not assume the full burden of taxation for certain services unless those services were actually received by the area.

The Committee recommends that consideration be given to legislative provision in the future to incorporate the view of the Union of British Columbia Municipalities.

The Committee recommends, as well, that the provisions of subsection (5) of section 12 of the *Municipal Act* be amended at this Session of the Legislature to make the provisions applicable to all classes of municipalities.

The Committee further recommends that the Department of Municipal Affairs, by August 31, 1972, ascertain the opinion of the municipalities on the subject-matter presented to the Committee by the Union of British Columbia Municipalities.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

REPORT

LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE ROOM,
March 28, 1972

MR. SPEAKER:

Your Special Committee to study the Report on Expropriation begs leave to report as follows:

This Committee has held five meetings for the consideration of the Report on Expropriation of the Law Reform Commission. Dr. Gosse, one of the members of the Commission, attended two of our meetings. We wish to express our appreciation to Dr. Gosse for his appearances before the Committee and for his help in explaining and clarifying the report of the Law Reform Commission.

The report of the Law Reform Commission is exceptionally comprehensive in its script and contains a great many recommendations, most of which are of a very fundamental nature. Individual members of the Committee have, to the extent that the breadth of the recommendations allow, drawn some tentative and some firm conclusions. In order for the Committee as a whole, however, to gauge properly the prospective effect of those recommendations, and in the event that they are not all practicable, to choose which should be implemented by legislation, it would be necessary, firstly, to hear the views held by those who can forecast the effect from actual experience, and secondly, to correlate those views and consolidate the various resulting opinions of the Committee members. For example, the Law Reform

Commission's suggestion with regard to a single acquisition agency is restricted to one that consideration be given to the advantages of the procedures mentioned, and expressly "not that steps should be taken to establish a single acquisition agency or to designate a particular department to be responsible for Crown expropriations," such consideration, to be carried out effectively, must be preceded by the acquisition of all information available as to those advantages.

Therefore, the Committee recognizes that:

(1) A single statute to control expropriation is needed.

(2) Government departments should study the subject with the objective of drafting legislation prior to the 1973 Session of the Legislature.

(3) The proposed legislation be subjected to a Committee of the Legislature appointed for that purpose during the 1973 Session, and so recommends.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

Mr. McDiarmid presented the Report of the Select Standing Committee on Forestry and Fisheries, as follows:

REPORT

LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE ROOM, March 28, 1972

MR. SPEAKER:

Your Select Standing Committee on Forestry and Fisheries begs leave to report as follows:

Pursuant to a motion on February 15, 1972, your Committee was ordered convened to study the following matter:

Resolved, That this House authorize the Select Standing Committee on Forestry and Fisheries to consider the reports prepared by the Forest Service pursuant to request of this Committee at the last Session on:

- 1. The Contractor Clause in Tree-farm Licences.
- 2. Log and Debris Salvage in the Strait of Georgia.

And examine into the disposal of chips, sawdust, and hogfuel arising from close-utilization policies which at the present time have caused

(a) an apparent oversupply of chips from sawmill production aggravated by depressed markets for pulp;

(b) reduced ability to dispose of sawdust and hogfuel coincident with a reduced pulp-mill demand and the pending restriction on burners which have been a major method of waste disposal up to the present time.

The objective would be to collect information and make recommendations concerning the short- and long-term problems relative to waste recovery and utilization. The Committee should seek submissions from interested forestry groups and from those who have had experience in using such waste for generation of steam.

Meetings were held and representations were heard from MacMillan & Bloedel; Central Interior Loggers; Cariboo Lumber Manufacturer's Association; Western Independent Log Hauler's Association; Vancouver Island Chip Supply; Western Canadian Regional Council No. 1, International Woodworkers of America;

Forest Industrial Relations; The Truck Logger's Association; The Chip Advisory Committee of B.C.; Cariboo Pulp & Paper Company; Gulf Log Salvage Co-operative; and Weyerhauser Canada Limited.

In addition, briefs were received from Ventura Engineering Limited; Jack Christensen, president, Tahsis Company; Bluebird Sawmills; and a group of log salvage operators.

30-50-per-cent Contractor Clause

Your Committee believes on the basis of submissions placed before it that the 30–50-per-cent contractor clause is in general being lived up to by the tree-farm licence holders. Your Committee reaffirms the provisions of the 30–50-per-cent contractor clause and is of the strong opinion that any agreement made between the tree-farm licence holder and a union should not in any way be binding upon or interfere with independent contractors operating under the 30–50-per-cent contractor clause.

Log and Debris Salvage in the Strait of Georgia

Your Committee concurs with the Forest Service recommendation that accumulated wood debris along the lower reaches of the Fraser River between Haney and the Mission Bridge be burned prior to the 1972 freshet. Your Committee recommends that if early high-water prevents completion of this project this spring, it should be completed by the Forest Service at a convenient time during the ensuing 12 months. The effect of this project on the Fraser River debris problem should continue to be monitored and a report prepared by the Forest Service for consideration by your Committee next year.

The problem of beach salvage for the Strait of Georgia near the East Coast of Vancouver Island was considered. It is apparent that at most, only 30 per cent of beach logs could be salvaged and utilized on an economic basis at this time. Your Committee believes that the Forest Service should encourage removal of as much usable beach wood as possible.

Your Committee recommends the continuation of Beach Clearance Licence 40 to Vancouver Island Chip Supply for such a period of time as the Forest Service may decide so that the relative efficiency of salvors working under this licence can be compared to those selling to Gulf Log Salvage at a proposed new depot at Ladysmith Harbour.

Pulp Chips

Your Committee heard evidence from many sources and is convinced that the present oversupply of chips is temporary and recommends against any long-term commitment to foreign purchasers. The Chip Advisory Committee of British Columbia seems to be functioning adequately and is currently disposing of chips on a contract basis not exceeding 12 months.

Your Committee deplores the burning of chips which has occurred and it has recommended that in each pulp-harvesting area it should be the responsibility of the pulp-mill to receive all by-product chips from wood-processing plants within that area and the problems of transportation, storage, utilization, or other disposal should be the responsibility of the receiving pulp-mill.

Hogfuel

To date the most efficient and most desirable method of disposal of hogfuel appears to be utilization as a fuel in specially designed burners within a pulp-mill, where heat thus generated is used in plant processing plus generation of electricity.

At this time, hogfuel is slightly more expensive than other fuels but the anticipated increase in price of those fuels is expected to make hogfuel more competitive in the near future. Not all hogfuel presently being produced can be utilized in this way and there is every indication of increasing volumes being produced in the future. Other forms of use for this material, such as mulch, particle board, etc., will absorb only a small fraction of production. Hogfuel is unsatisfactory for land fill except in highly selective areas. The burning of hogfuel in nonpolluting burners to produce energy for dry kiln operations or electricity, or a combination of both, appears to be the only likely solution to the pollution problem caused by excess production of hogfuel.

A study is under way to explore this possibility near Williams Lake, and a

report is expected this spring.

Your Committee recommends that a Province-wide study of present and future volumes of hogfuel production be undertaken and methods by which it can most efficiently be utilized in various parts of the Province be studied.

Your Committee believes that the Research Council of British Columbia would

be admirably suited to undertake such a study.

The Hon. R. R. Loffmark presented the Twenty-third Annual Report of the British Columbia Hospital Insurance Service for 1971.

166 Mr. Strachan asked the Hon. the Minister of Health Services and Hospital Insurance the following questions:

With reference to Vote 108, Code 033—Payments to Hospitals \$230,000,000, Estimates of Expenditure, 1972/73—

- 1. Will any part of the said \$230,000,000 be paid as the payment of the Government share of the hospital construction debt?
 - 2. If the answer to No. 1 is yes, what will be the total sum so paid?
- 3. If the answer to No. 1 is no, will any money be paid by the Government toward hospital construction debt under any other vote in the 1972/73 Estimates of Expenditure and, if so, which vote and how much will be paid to the hospitals as the Government share of hospital construction debt?

The Hon. R. R. Loffmark replied as follows:

"1 and 2. Included in Vote 108, Code 033, Payments to Hospitals, are provisions for several classes of grants in respect of hospital construction. One such class of grants relates to payments made directly to individual hospital boards toward the cost of minor renovations, etc. A second class includes grants for hospital-construction projects not included in Regional Hospital District financing, e.g., hospital projects such as the Health Sciences Centre at the University of British Columbia, financed jointly by the Provincial and Federal Governments.

"The Deputy Minister of Hospital Insurance is also required to pay annual grants out of the Hospital Insurance Fund to the Boards of Regional Hospital Districts. These grants which are estimated to amount to a total of \$6,400,000 for the

1972/73 fiscal year are computed as follows:

"(a) From the estimated total expenditure provided for in a district's budget adopted for the current year there is deducted (i) all amounts received or due from

the Government of Canada on account of hospital projects to which that expenditure relates, other than amounts deducted on a previous computation; (ii) items of expense determined by the Minister to be the sole responsibility of the district; and (iii) the total amount provided in the budget for the payment of principal and interest assumed or for the reimbursement to be provided in respect of a completed hospital project.

"The resulting sum constitutes the total expense toward which the grant is made."

"(b) The capital grant is 60 per cent of the total expense calculated under clause (a) above until the share of such expense borne by the Board has reached an amount equivalent to a levy of four mills on the assessed value of land and 75 per cent of the assessed value of improvements in the district, including the amount mentioned in paragraph (iii) of clause (a), and 80 per cent of any additional expense calculated under clause (a).

"The administration and disposition of each such grant becomes the responsibility of the Regional Hospital District Board that receives it.

"3. See Nos. 1 and 2."

That I respectfully and earnestly object and protest against the granting of certification to a three-party labour consortium by the Labour Relations Board of British Columbia for the hourly paid employees of National Paper Box Limited. The certification was granted without a hearing being conducted at which the employees of the plant could be represented.

Wherefore your petitioner humbly prays that your Honourable House may be pleased to recommend that the Labour Relations Board conduct a democratic vote as requested by over 80 per cent of the employees in signed petition to the Board.

And as in duty bound, your petitioner will ever pray.

Mr. Jefcoat presented the Report of the Select Standing Committee on Agriculture, as follows:

REPORT

LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE ROOM, March 29, 1972

MR. SPEAKER:

Your Select Standing Committee on Agriculture begs leave to report as follows: On February 9, 1972, on the motion of the Hon. C. M. Shelford it was Ordered:

That this House authorize the Select Standing Committee on Agriculture to assess the impact on British Columbia agriculture of food products which are imported from other countries and from other parts of Canada, with particular reference to those products which are produced in substantial volume in this Province.

The Committee shall have the power to send for persons, papers, and records and to hear representations from the food and agricultural industry, from Government officials, and from such organizations and individuals as may, in their discretion, appear necessary, and shall report its findings and recommendations to this House.

1. In its study of the impact on British Columbia agriculture of imports from points outside the Province, the Select Standing Committee on Agriculture conducted 11 public hearings at which 22 briefs were presented by individuals and groups representing producers, marketing boards, wholesalers, processors, and retailers of food and agricultural products.

The B.C. Interior Vegetable Marketing Board was represented by R. Freeze, chairman; Fred Hack, vice-president; and Eric Magee, secretary-treasurer.

The Department of Agriculture was represented by M. M. Gilchrist, Markets Commissioner.

The Broiler Marketing Board was represented by chairman, Harry Leidtke. Western Food Processors was represented by Messrs. Rankin, Penner, Kitson, Bloomfield, and Luscombe.

B.C. Cattlemen's Association was represented by Ron Pilling.

Federation of Retail Food Council of British Columbia was represented by A. C. Abbott, president, and Al Mesmer, Hi-Lo Food Company; John Kristensen, Safeway; Tom Milburn, Safeway; Merv Hampton, Supervalu; and Mrs. Joan Gadsby, recording secretary.

B.C. Federation of Agriculture was represented by Dick Stocks.

The Fraser Valley Fruit and Vegetable Grower's Association was represented by Nick DeWahl.

The Products Division of Woodwards Stores was represented by W. A. Eadie. The National Farmers Union, Region 8, was represented by L. Butler, president, and Roy Atkinson, National President of the Farmers Union.

The B.C. Tree Fruit Board was represented by Nigel Taylor and Carl Stevenson. The Meat Packers Council of Canada was represented by Messrs. Tolton, Ralph Towsley, W. E. Mathewson, and Martin Morgan.

The B.C. Egg Marketing Board was represented by Ed Morgan and William Brunsdon.

The B.C. Turkey Marketing Board was represented by Ed Pratt and C. Stanley. The Independent Egg Industry Association was represented by Ed Lightfoot and Walter Oliver.

The South Peace Marketing Board was represented by R. Johnson.

The B.C. Coast Vegetable Marketing Board was represented by Messrs. Ed Gilmore, Walsh, and A. Barker.

The Okanagan-Mainline Egg Producers Association was represented by Messrs. A. Link, D. Lewis, and R. Pridham.

The B.C. Egg Producers Association was represented by Glen Redline.

The B.C. Grape Marketing Board was represented by Dr. E. F. Avery, Messrs. E. Raikes and L. R. Stephens.

The B.C. Swine Breeders' Association, The Consumers' Association of Canada (B.C.), and the sheep industry of the Peace River Block also submitted briefs.

- 2. Throughout the hearings there was evidence that present levels of food imports cause substantial damage to certain segments of British Columbia's agricultural industry. Among those most seriously affected are the vegetable, soft fruit, strawberry, greenhouse, chicken broiler, turkey, and egg industries. The food-processing industry is also under intense pressures from imports coming from low-cost areas.
- 3. Existing forms of protection such as tariffs, import quotas, agricultural stabilization payments, surtaxes, and other relief measures, all of which are under Federal jurisdiction, were found to be generally inadequate in maintaining a viable agricultural industry in this Province.
- 4. It was noted that the dairy industry is in a reasonably viable state and in this connection it is important to note that no one in Canada can import milk or dairy products without obtaining an import permit from the Canadian Dairy Commission. Similarly, no one can import feed grains without a permit from the Canadian Wheat Board. It is significant to note that neither dairy products nor domestic feed grains are under pressure from imports.
- 5. The Committee found that this Province, because of its close proximity to large food-producing areas in the Western United States and Mexico, is particularly vulnerable to the dumping of surplus products. Even a small surplus from these areas, dumped into our traditional domestic markets seriously affects our industries. Because of the lateness of British Columbia's cropping season, peak production of many commodities here coincides with clean-up operations on the same commodities to the south. Their cleanup, if directed to British Columbia, can impart substantial hurt to our agricultural industry. The same kind of damage is done by low price quotations from these areas, even though actual quantities shipped may be small.
- 6. The Committee deplores the fact that we are losing the beef finishing and processing industry and recommends that the Department of Agriculture give consideration to ways and means of aiding the finishing of beef in this Province, preferably using Provincially grown grain.
- 7. On the basis of the evidence presented, the Committee is able to conclude that the impact of food imports to this Province from other countries and other provinces is substantial and is a major constraint to the further development of British Columbia's agricultural industry. Accordingly, the Committee recommends:
 - (a) The Government introduce legislation which would provide authority for the Minister of Agriculture to require permits for the importation of specified food and feed products and to require the identification of the source

of such products. The use of the term "importation" includes the inter-

Provincial movement of products.

(b) That the Government of British Columbia make representations to the Government of Canada requesting that an automatic surtax based on reasonable "moving average" prices based on the previous three-year average be implemented in Canada to replace the present slow and cumbersome machinery which is presently used in combatting the effects of low-priced imports.

(c) That the Government of British Columbia establish a \$25,000,000 fund from which the Minister of Agriculture could authorize loans and guarantees, which would encourage substantial development of British Columbia's food and agricultural industry among British Columbia's primary

producers.

- (d) That the Department of Agriculture increase its efforts in sales promotion of British Columbia grown products and increase dialogue among producers, consumers, processors, wholesale and retail merchandisers through a British Columbia Advisory Food Council, as recommended in the 1971 Report of the Select Standing Committee on Agriculture; also that the Department of Agriculture be renamed the Department of Food and Agriculture to encompass this broader jurisdiction.
- (e) That the Department of Agriculture and the Department of Industrial Development, Trade, and Commerce establish a joint committee to study disparities in domestic and export freight rates between various points in British Columbia and Canada; the committee to make recommendations on methods of reducing these disparities.

(f) That the Department of Agriculture make strong representations to the Federal Food and Drug Directorate requesting assurance that food products entering British Columbia are thoroughly checked and found to be free from pesticide residue banned by the Province of British Columbia.

(g) The Committee received reports from the Egg Marketing Board and representatives of the egg producers indicating severe conflict between the areas served by the Egg Marketing Board. We note with interest that the Minister of Agriculture has indicated to the Board that they must take immediate action to overcome their internal problems. The Egg Marketing Board reaction will be carefully noted by members of this Committee.

Your Select Standing Committee on Public Accounts and Printing begs leave to report as follows:

Your Committee summoned Mr. Willard E. Ireland, Chairman of the Public Documents Committee, established by the Public Documents Disposal Act, Revised

Statutes of British Columbia, 1960, chapter 134, and, having heard the submission on behalf of the Public Documents Committee, recommends that, in accordance with the provisions of the Public Documents Disposal Act, approval be given for the destruction of various public documents as listed in the submissions to the Public Documents Committee for 1970 in so far as the following departments of Government are concerned: Education; Finance; Health Services and Hospital Insurance; Industrial Development, Trade, and Commerce; Lands, Forests, and Water Resources; Provincial Secretary; and further recommends that the various public documents as listed in the submission to the said Public Documents Committee by the Department of Labour be transferred to the custody of the Provincial Archives.

The following departments were dealt with: Agriculture; Commercial Transport; Education, Curriculum Resources Branch, Registrar's Branch, Research and Standards Branch; Finance; Health Services and Hospital Insurance, Division of V.D. Control, Division of Laboratories, Division of TB. Control, Division of Vital Statistics, Health Branch (Local Health Services), Health Branch Central Office, Environmental Engineering Division, British Columbia Hospital Insurance Service Hospital Construction Division; Provincial Secretary, Government House; Public Works, Safety Engineering Services Division.

Your Committee afforded its members several opportunities for the examination of vouchers supplied by the Comptroller-General. These vouchers were supplied from various votes on the request of the members through the Chairman.

With reference to persons receiving social assistance but excluding those who are taking part in "work activity projects" under the Canada Assistance Act—

- 1. Have any persons been placed in employment in 1971/72 with the person's salary or wages being shared in any way between the employer and the Provincial Government?
- 2. If the answer to No. 1 is yes, (a) how many persons were placed, (b) what are the names of the employers involved, (c) what is the financial basis of the cost-sharing between Government and employer, (d) are the salaries or wages being paid at union rates, (e) how many of these placements are on a temporary basis and how many permanent, and (f) are any of these persons receiving specific training in any occupation and, if so, how many, and in what trades or occupation and what is the duration of the training in each trade or occupation?

The Hon. P. A. Gaglardi replied as follows:

- "1. Yes.
- "2. (a) 148 to January 31 under the 'On-the-Job Training' programme, there were also a very few heads of families to whom social assistance was continued for a temporary period while they were fully employed at going rates, these were cases where additional assistance was considered urgent and necessary to enhance or make possible the recipient's rehabilitation and economic independence.
 - "(b) It is not the policy of the Department to publish this information.
- "(c) Under the terms of 'On-the-Job Training' programme, social assistance is continued at the prevailing rate for up to three months, the employer pays the

additional salary to bring the total income up to going rates in the local area and pays all fringe benefit costs where these apply. In those exceptional cases where it is considered necessary to continue assistance for a temporary period during a person's full-time employment, social assistance is continued at the prevailing or adjusted rate depending on need.

"(d) Yes, where these apply.

"(e) It is the Department's policy in all such arrangements that the employee

should have the expectation of continuing employment.

"(f) Yes, detailed information on the particular types of training each participant is undertaking is not available. The 'On-the-Job Training' period may be extended up to three months and should pertain to a specific skill or occupation or a particular type of work."

68 Mr. Hall asked the Hon. the Minister of Rehabilitation and Social Improvement the following questions:

- 6. Have any persons placed in employment by the Alliance been in receipt of social assistance during their employment in the periods (a) fiscal 1969/70, (b) fiscal 1970/71, and (c) fiscal 1971 to date?
- 7. With respect to the staff of the Provincial Alliance of Businessmen, how many employees left the service of the Alliance, if any, and for what reasons and what were their names?

The Hon. P. A. Gaglardi replied as follows:

- "1. It is estimated at 80 per cent.
- "2. It is estimated at 80 per cent.
- "3. Yes, the nature of certain employment results in periodic shut downs and subsequent rehiring which is done through the Provincial Alliance of Businessmen.
 - "4. This statistic is not available.
 - "5. This statistic is not available.

That in view of the motion accepted by the Government of Canada on September 8, 1971, that a copy of the Stanbury-Fields Report be tabled subject to the concurrence of the Province of British Columbia, this House requests this Government to table the said report in this House or to signify its concurrence with the tabling of the said report in the House of Commons.

A debate arose, which was, on the motion of the Hon. D. R. J. Campbell, adjourned to the next sitting of the House.

Mr. Nimsick moved, seconded by Mr. Hartley-

That this House authorize the Select Standing Committee on Labour to review the *Workmen's Compensation Act* with a view to recommending any necessary amendments to the Act:

And that the Committee shall have the power to send for persons, papers, and records and to hear representations from organizations and persons interested.

Motion negatived.

Mr. Nimsick moved, seconded by Mr. Hall-

Resolved, That this House authorize the Select Standing Committee on Standing Orders and Private Bills to review the Rules of the House relating to the adjournment of sittings.

Motion negatived.

The Hon. Isabel P. Dawson moved, seconded by the Hon. D. R. J. Campbell—

That this House deeply regrets the refusal of the Government of Canada to assist with the financing of the Pacific North Coast Native Indian Co-operative Seafood Processing Plant at Port Simpson, British Columbia, the application for which project was made in conformity with the Federal-Provincial Rural Development Agreement made between Canada and this Province on May 14, 1970:

And be it further Resolved, That this House urge the Canadian Department of Regional and Economic Expansion to forthwith re-examine and reverse that decision in the light of representations made.

Motion agreed to.

Mr. Hartley moved, seconded by Mr. Calder-

That this House recommend that the Government consider the advisability of providing Court workers to assist native people arrested or summonsed for Court appearances.

Mr. Speaker ruled the motion out of order in the hands of a private member on the ground that it offended Standing Order 66 as involving the expenditure of public funds.

Mr. Hartley moved, seconded by Mr. Hall—

That this House recommends that pharmacists be allowed to substitute generic name drugs for brand name drugs unless the doctor specifically indicates otherwise on a prescription, and provided the generic drug is equivalent to and cheaper than the brand name drug.

A debate arose, which was, on the motion of the Hon. R. R. Loffmark, adjourned to the next sitting of the House.

By leave of the House, on the motion of Mr. Hall, the following notice of motion standing in his name on the Order Paper was withdrawn:

That the subject-matter of Bill (No. 88) be referred to the Select Standing Committee on Labour for consideration and report.

Mr. McGeer moved, seconded by Mr. L. A. Williams—

Resolved, That this Legislature communicate immediately to the Prime Minister of Canada and the President of the United States its opinion that the Trans-Alaska pipe-line not be built and that an alternative oil pipe-line be built down the Mackenzie Valley in Canada.

A debate arose, which was, on the motion of Mr. Smith, adjourned to the next sitting of the House.

Mr. McGeer moved, seconded by Mr. L. A. Williams—

Resolved, That this Legislature recommends that priority be given to construction of the British Columbia portion of the Fort Nelson to Fort Simpson Highway so that road and rail access to the proposed Mackenzie Valley pipe-line be established through the Province of British Columbia.

Motion negatived.

On a point of order being raised by the Hon. the Attorney-General that the Bill interfered with the prerogatives of the Crown, Mr. Speaker sustained the point of order and further stated that the Bill was out of order in the hands of a private member in that it offended Standing Order 66 as involving the expenditure of public funds.

Bill Ordered dropped from the Order Paper.

His Honour was pleased in Her Majesty's name to give assent to the said Bills.

The said assent was announced by E. K. DeBeck, Esq., Clerk of the House, in the following words:

"In Her Majesty's name, His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor doth assent to these Bills."

Then Mr. Speaker addressed the Lieutenant-Governor as follows:

May IT PLEASE YOUR HONOUR:

We, Her Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects, the Legislative Assembly of the Province of British Columbia, in Session assembled, approach Your Honour at the close of our labours with sentiments of unfeigned devotion and loyalty to Her Majesty's person and Government and humbly beg to present for Your Honour's acceptance Bill (No. 101) intituled An Act for Granting Certain Sums of Money for the Public Service of the Province of British Columbia.

To this Bill the Clerk of the Legislative Assembly, by His Honour's command, did thereupon say:

"In Her Majesty's name, His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor doth thank Her Majesty's loyal subjects, accept their benevolence, and assent to this Bill."

Then His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor was pleased to deliver the following gracious Speech:

Mr. Speaker and Members of the Legislative Assembly:

In closing this, the Third Session of the Twenty-ninth Parliament of British Columbia, I desire to express my appreciation for the care and sincerity which have characterized your deliberations. I am grateful that legislation has been enacted which will be of benefit to the citizens of this Province.

As this Province enters its second century, marked by this Session of the Legislature, my Government continues in the forefront with a legislative programme designed for the second century. The programme carries on the successful economic policies of the past quarter century, and in addition has introduced legislative changes designed for the future of British Columbia and the benefit of all of its citizens.

In the economic area, as a result of the financial policies of my Government, no tax increases were necessary. Instead, by reason of the revenue surpluses built up by careful husbandry of the resources of the Province, a number of special funds have been created which will provide the citizens with funds for a number of creative and substantial special projects. Among the special funds created by legislation at this Session were:

Green Belt Protection Fund Act—25 million dollars for establishment and maintenance of green belts in the Province.

Accelerated Park Development Fund Act—10 million dollars to provide additional employment in the development of parks.

Accelerated Reforestation Fund Act—10 million dollars to accelerate a programme of reforestation and create jobs.

In addition, my Government has increased two of the Perpetual Funds — the Physical Fitness and Amateur Sports Fund and the British Columbia Cultural Fund — by 5 million dollars each. These two Perpetual Funds are now in the value of 15 million dollars each, and the annual earnings from these funds will benefit the citizens of British Columbia in the fields of physical fitness and culture in perpetuity.

My Government has also made provision for grants to municipalities for subsidizing rapid-transit systems and for the development of underground utility lines under the Rapid Transit Provincial Subsidy Act and the Power and Telephone Line Beautification Fund Act.

In commemoration of our Centennial Year, a special scholarship of \$5,000 per year was established. This scholarship is called the "Queen Elizabeth II British Columbia Centennial Scholarship."

In addition, a further sum of 25 million dollars was authorized to purchase the outstanding shares of the Pacific Great Eastern Railway, which, by legislation, has now been renamed the "British Columbia Railway Company," a railway system now completely owned and operated by the people of British Columbia.

In view of the Federal Government's withdrawal from the estate and gift tax field, my Government has enacted a Gift Tax Act so that our present Succession Duty Act will continue to be co-ordinated with the Gift Tax Act in respect of gifting situations, with no increase in gifting rates. Moreover, my Government has increased the succession duty exemption to a total of \$150,000 value from a previous exemption of \$60,000. In addition, the legislation provides for payment of succession duty on a family farm or family business over a period of 10 years without interest.

In the constant struggle to combat inflation and preserve the purchasing power of the people of British Columbia, my Government has amended the *Constitution Act*, the *Public Schools Act*, the *Municipal Act*, and the *Vancouver Charter* to restrict salary increases for all sectors of the economy supported in whole or in part by public funds to a percentage considered economically proper and feasible in light of our financial resources.

Furthermore, my Government has enacted an Act, entitled the *Elderly Citizen Renters Grant Act*, to pay \$50 a year subsidy to persons over 65 years who rent accommodation. Also, an increase in the Home-owner Grant by \$15 a year to \$185, with an additional \$50 for home-owners over 65 years, provides a substantial measure of financial relief on their home taxes to the elderly citizens of the Province. This, together with an injection of a further 25 million dollars into the Home Acquisition Fund, under the *Provincial Home Acquisition Act*, and a continuation of the older-home mortgage scheme for an indefinite period, provides substantial capital requirements for housing developments and enables thousands of additional citizens to own their own homes.

In the development of the administration of law and in the improvement of those laws that have an impact on the lives of our citizens, a large number of new Acts have been passed and a substantial number of amendments to existing provisions have been made. Notable among these are:

- (1) Administration Act, providing new rules for notifying all beneficiaries in an estate, and giving a life estate in a matrimonial home to a spouse on an intestacy.
- (2) Summary Convictions Act, providing for serving sentences of imprisonment on week-ends or in broken periods.
- (3) Mortgage Brokers Act, providing for disclosure of all bonuses or discounts in certain mortgage transactions.
- (4) *Motor-vehicle Act*, providing for compulsory suspension of a driver on conviction for impaired driving, and for new rules for notifying another driver or owner of property in an accident.
- (5) Criminal Injuries Compensation Act, providing for compensation by the Workmen's Compensation Board for injuries received as a victim of crime or in assisting a peace officer to prevent crime.
- (6) Insurance Act, providing for more expeditious settlement of accident claims and encouraging prepayments.

(7) Family Relations Act, a comprehensive revision of the law of family relations and maintenance of spouses and children, recommended by a Committee of this House after introduction by my Government.

In the area of Health Services, a number of measures have been enacted, among which are:

- (1) Change of Name Act, simplifying the procedures in obtaining a change of name.
- (2) Human Tissue Gift Act, enlarging the Act to permit inter vivos gifts of tissue.
- (3) Community Care Facilities Licensing Act, enlarging the definition of facilities and clarifying municipal responsibility in this area.

The Department of Public Works recommended to the House a complete revision of the legislation dealing with steam and pressure vessels, gas and electricity installations, which was enacted by my Government under the Safety Engineering Services Act.

Under the Department of the Provincial Secretary, amendments were introduced to the *Public Libraries Act* providing for integrated regional library services and a new *Archæological and Historic Sites Protection Act* was passed to protect and preserve our historic sites and artifacts.

The Pipe-lines Act and the Petroleum and Natural Gas Act have been amended to provide the necessary legislative authority to deal with oil spills. The Pollution Control Act, 1967 has been strengthened, and administration of air pollution in the Vancouver area was assigned to the Greater Vancouver Regional District as agent for the Minister.

The Social Assistance Act has been amended to focus the responsibility for social assistance benefits and procedures in my Executive Council on the recommendations of the Minister.

In the municipal area, substantial amendments have been made to the Municipal Act containing a wide range of benefits and improved procedures in respect of municipalities. The Municipal Finance Authority Act has been strengthened to improve the consultative machinery and the marketability of the security issues of the Authority. A First Citizens of British Columbia Corporation Act was passed for the encouragement and marketing of Indian arts and crafts.

New benefits have been made available under amendments to the *Workmen's Compensation Act* resulting in this Province being in advance of most of Canada in this protection to our workmen.

In the field of education, amendments have been made to the *Public Schools Act* to set out procedures for suspension and dismissal, and also to require ratepayer approval for school budgets exceeding a fixed percentage increase.

Your approval of Supply in the record sum of more than one billion, four hundred and fifty-one million dollars is an indication of the continued growth and prosperity of the Province, and will enable my Government to carry out the important and beneficial programmes authorized by these enactments.

Members of the Legislative Assembly, I thank you for your earnest deliberations and labours and for the supply granted for the public service. Honourable Members, I now relieve you of your legislative duties, and I trust that the blessing of Divine Providence will accompany you to your respective homes.

The Hon. W. D. Black (Provincial Secretary) then said:

Mr. Speaker and Members of the Legislative Assembly:

It is His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor's will and pleasure that the Legislative Assembly be prorogued until it shall please the Lieutenant-Governor to summon the same for dispatch of business, and this Provincial Legislative Assembly is hereby prorogued accordingly.
